1 Introduction

This chapter describes the DIGITAL ATM modular PHY (modPHY) cards.

1.1 ATM modPHY Cards

The ATM modPHY cards allow the exchange of data between different ATM systems using particular Physical Layer (PHY) types. ATM modPHY cards provide the media-specific portion of an ATM interface to support ATM connectivity across multiple platforms for different media types at speeds up to 155.52 Mb/s.


The host system provides the power, initialization, and control for the modPHY card. The modPHY card is used with an ATM segmentation and reassembly (SAR) or cell-switching function.

ATM modPHY cards are optional single-port daughter cards that:

- Provide a customer-installable, field-replaceable module
- Provide front insertion, hotswapping capabilities, and FLOWmaster flow control if supported by the host system
- Support cabling and connectors for:
 - STS-3c (155 Mb/s) multimode fiber (MMF), DAGGM-AA
 - STS-3c (155 Mb/s) single-mode fiber (SMF), DAGGS-AA
 - STS-3c (155 Mb/s) unshielded twisted-pair (UTP) or
 - STS-3c (155 Mb/s) screened twisted-pair (ScTP), DAGGU-AA
 - T3 (44 Mb/s) coaxial, DAGGT-AA
 - E3 (34 Mb/s) coaxial, DAGGE-AA
 - E1 (2 Mb/s) short reach twisted-pair (TP), DAGE1-AA
 - T1 (1.54 Mb/s) short reach twisted-pair (TP), DAGT1-AA

1.2 Hotswap Support

The modPHY cards support hotswap. However, make sure that your host system supports hotswap before attempting to perform this operation. Refer to the host system's documentation for information about hotswap support.

Note

Hotswapping a modPHY card in a host system that does not support hotswap can cause undesired behavior.

2 Installing the modPHY Card

This chapter explains how to install the DIGITAL ATM modPHY card.

2.1 Unpacking and Checking the Contents

The modPHY card is shipped in one box. Remove the contents from the box and be sure to keep all original packing materials.

Check the shipment for damage. In case of damage, contact your delivery agent and your DIGITAL sales representative.

Caution

Static electricity can damage modules and electronic components. DIGITAL recommends using a grounded antistatic wrist strap and a grounded work surface when handling any modules.

2.2 Required Tools

Installation of the ATM modPHY card requires the following tools:

- Phillips-head screwdriver
- Antistatic grounding strap

2.3 Preparing for Installation

Before you begin to install the ATM modPHY card into the system unit, you must understand whether your system supports hotswap and how that might affect your system.

Note

Hotswapping a modPHY card in a host system that does not support hotswap can cause undesired behavior.

The steps needed to initialize a modPHY card inserted into an operational system can vary. For additional information about your specific system, refer to the other documentation that shipped with your system unit.

2.4 Preparing a System

To prepare your system for the modPHY card installation, perform these steps:

- 1. Refer to the host system's documentation to determine what steps you need to take before installing any modPHY cards. For example, check to see whether you need to power down the system or remove any modules before attempting this operation.
- 2. Determine which ports to use.
- 3. Remove the component that is in the slot of the selected port.
 - Remove the modPHY card if there is already one in the slot. Refer to Section 2.4.1 for more information about this procedure.
 - Remove an empty option slot cover from your system unit (see Section 2.4.2).


2.4.1 Removing the Card

Refer to Figure 2–1 when removing the modPHY card.

- 1. Locate the captive screws that fasten the modPHY card to the host module.
- 2. Set up the electrostatic discharge (ESD) equipment.
- 3. Slip on the ESD wrist strap.
- 4. Use a Phillips-head screwdriver to loosen the two captive screws that hold the modPHY card in place. Loosen each screw until it is freed from the chassis (about 0.25 inch [0.63 cm]). The screws should be loose but still attached to the modPHY card.

- 5. Grasp the captive screws and disconnect the modPHY card from the host by pulling on the screws. Gently slide the modPHY card out of the slot after you have disconnected it from the host.
- 6. Place the modPHY card in a static-proof bag.

Figure 2–1 Removing the modPHY Card




2.4.2 Removing the Slot Cover

Refer to Figure 2–2 when removing the slot cover.

- 1. Use a Phillips-head screwdriver to loosen the two captive screws that hold the option slot cover in place.
- 2. Save the option slot cover.

2.5 Installing the Card

Refer to Figure 2–3 when installing the ATM modPHY card into your system.

1. Attach one end of the antistatic wrist strap to your wrist and the other end to the system.


Caution

Static electricity can damage modules and electronic components. DIGITAL recommends using a grounded antistatic wrist strap and a grounded work surface when handling any modules.

2. Hold the modPHY card by the edges and position it so that it is parallel with the slot opening.

- 3. Insert the modPHY card through the opening in the system unit by aligning the sides of the modPHY card with the card guide.
- 4. Push the modPHY card into the slot until the 96-pin connector is firmly seated on the motherboard.
- 5. Fasten the modPHY card to the system unit with the two captive screws. Torque to 5 in-lb (0.56 N-m).

Using the modPHY Card

This chapter explains the operation of the DIGITAL ATM modPHY cards. After you install the card, it must be initialized.

3.1 Initializing the modPHY Card

The modPHY card must be initialized upon insertion into your system. Systems that support hotswap perform this procedure automatically. Refer to your system documentation for information about module initialization and hotswap support.

After initialization, the two LEDs on the modPHY card provide information about its operation. The Physical Layer (PHY) LED is labeled PHY and indicates the state of the Physical Layer interface. The field-replaceable unit/mode (FRU/Mode) status LED is labeled with a broken line and indicates the port's fault or diagnostic status.

If your system supports hotswap, the PHY and FRU/Mode LEDs flash green three times after the modPHY card is inserted to indicate the recognition and initialization of the modPHY card. Table 3–1 describes other LED indications that occur after this point.

If your system was powered up before the insertion of the modPHY card and it does not support hotswap, the LEDs should remain unlit.

If none of the LEDs light within 10 seconds after the card is inserted, either your system does not support hotswap or the card has a fault.

- If your system does not support hotswap, you have to reinitialize the host module. Refer to your system documentation for more information.
- If your system supports hotswap, replace your card or contact your DIGITAL sales representative.

3.2 Verifying Operability

A modPHY card might be operational but inactive because it is not connected to a remote system. In this situation, both the PHY and FRU/Mode LEDs are unlit.

Once the card is connected to another system, verify that the connection is active by checking the LEDs.

If your system supports hotswap and:

- Neither LED lights, you should perform a loopback test.
- The LEDs do light, refer to Table 3–1 to determine whether you must take any action.

Table 3–1 LED Conditions

Indication	Action
FRU/Mode LED is amber.	The diagnostics have detected a fault. If possible, try the modPHY card in another slot to determine whether the modPHY card or the host module contains the fault. If the modPHY card contains the fault, replace your card or contact your DIGITAL sales representative.
FRU/Mode LED is blinking green.	The port has been redirected elsewhere. See the host system's documentation for more information about a redirected port.
PHY LED is green.	No action is necessary. The card is working properly and a link is established.
PHY LED is amber.	The port is inactive due to excessive media errors. Per form loopback testing to isolate the problem.
PHY LED is blinking green.	The card has been disabled by management.
PHY LED is off.	Refer to Section 3.3 for information about checking your connections. There might be a connection prob- lem because the port is unable to receive from the neighboring switch or station.

3.3 Checking the Connections

If you cannot establish a link to an attached system, make sure that you have the correct cable for your particular type of port. For example, SMF cables are not interchangeable with MMF cables even though they look similar.

3.3.1 Using Loopback Connectors

If the correct cables are being used, test the port connections with loopback connectors. Loopback connectors help to isolate your connection problems. Refer to Appendix A for more information about the appropriate loopback connectors used for testing different types of ports.

3.3.2 Performing Loopback Testing

Loopback testing verifies the ability of a port to transmit and receive, and isolates a problem to a particular element of a connection; that is, one of the ports or the media connecting them. Tests on the individual ports allow independent verification of each port as operational. If neither port is identified as faulty, the media is suspected. If replacement cables cannot be used, then continuity tests or cable loss measurements are needed to identify the media problems for repair purposes.

The loopback test configuration involves connecting a particular port's transmitter to its own receiver. (Special connectors or cables might be required.) In this configuration, the PHY LED should be solid green. Other LED indications are associated with module faults or uninitialized cards.

Refer to Appendix A for more information about attaching and removing connectors.

3.4 Configuring the Physical Layer

The modPHY cards support the following modes of operation:

- Diagnostic mode
- Normal mode with local clock and loop timing
- Synchronous clock domains

The user can configure these operation modes by using host-specific commands. The commands to invoke these modes can be found in the host system documentation that describes the host's management facilities.

3.4.1 Diagnostic Mode

In addition to the external loopback configuration described in Section 3.3, modPHY cards also support a diagnostic mode called line loopback. In line-loopback mode, the port's received data stream becomes the transmitted data stream instead of normal host-supplied data. This mode is commonly used to determine the bit-error rate

performance of the receiver or to allow links to be tested from the far end of a connection. A host cannot communicate using a port that is in this special diagnostic mode. All modPHY cards support this mode of operation.

3.4.2 Clock Modes During Normal Operation

During normal operation, the received data is passed from the modPHY card to the host and outgoing host data is transmitted by the modPHY card. Each modPHY card supports two modes of transmitter operation as defined by the source of the clock used for transmission.

• Local clock source operation:

Transmission is based on a local clock source. All modPHY cards support this mode which is the default configuration.

Some modPHY cards accept a local clock reference from the host system and can transmit synchronously to other ports as described in Section 3.4.3.

• Loop-timing operation:

Host data is transmitted based on the external clock recovered by the same port's receiver. All modPHY cards have this capability although it must be selected by management.

This mode of operation is often required for connections to a public service provider. If loop-timing operation is selected but the received clock is absent, the port will transmit based on a local reference until a received clock is again recovered by the port.

3.4.3 Synchronous Clock Domains

Some ATM applications require timing information derived from a clock recovered from the network data connection and require the exact recovered clock frequency. A synchronous clock domain includes the set of nodes that transmit signals based on a single reference clock and the nodes that receive and use this timing information.

The modPHY cards that can be part of a synchronous clock domain are the DAGGM-AA, DAGGS-AA, and DAGGU-AA cards. These modPHY cards can transmit with a signal synchronized to other ports on the same host. The size of this clock domain depends heavily on the capability of the ATM switch that is the mod-PHY host. If an ATM switch has the capability to accept an external clock, then this common clock domain can span multiple switches.

The DAGGM-AA, DAGGS-AA, and DAGGU-AA modPHY cards can be chosen by the host to provide the external reference clock signal. All other DIGITAL ATM modPHY cards cannot be synchronized to other ports nor provide an external reference clock signal to the host.

3.5 Configuration Guidelines for Physical Layer Parameters

This section describes the configuration options for Physical layer (PHY) parameters that you should be aware of when trying to manage connections to your DIGITAL ATM modPHY cards. In particular, you must manually configure the following PHY parameters if the default values for your ATM modPHY card connections do not agree with those of an attached node:

- Framing
- Cell mapping
- Clock source
- Line buildout

All these parameters have default values during normal operation. If you use these default values, loopback testing should be successful and indicate any faults.

You can set the values of some parameters to support interoperability with other equipment using the ATM console commands or SNMP for your system modules. However, if you change the default values for the clock source or line buildout parameters, loopback testing might fail. Check your host system documentation for information about other PHY types that might not be listed.

3.5.1 Framing

The framing parameters must be the same at both ends of a connection or it might result in an inoperational connection. The values of the framing parameters for different PHY types are shown in Table 3–2.

Notes

3.5.2 Cell Mapping

The cell mapping parameters must be the same at both ends of a connection or it will result in an inoperational connection. The values of the cell mapping parameters for different PHY types are shown in Table 3–3.

Notes

1. PLCP supports the option of transmitting cells with the Physical Layer Convergence Protocol (PLCP).

2. ADM supports the option of transmitting cells with ATM Direct Mapping (ADM) as defined by ATM Forum UNI 3.1 specification.

3.5.3 Clock Source

The clock source parameter is configured to meet the needs of the application. In LAN applications, the clock source is usually a local reference. In some WAN applications, the port must be manually configured to operate in loop timing. Each PHY type supports two modes of transmitter operation, either local clock source operation or loop-timing operation (see Section 3.4.2), as defined by the source of the clock used for transmission.

The values of the clock source parameters for different PHY types are shown in Table 3–4.

When the system module is rebooted, the nonvolatile configuration records for each populated port are examined. When a modPHY is initialized, the default setting is used unless another value has already been configured.

The same sequence of actions occur if a port is unpopulated at module powerup, but is populated later.

When a PHY type change occurs during modPHY hotswap, the new port is reinitialized with the default setting (local timing). When modPHY hotswap does *not* result in PHY type change, the port is reinitialized with its last known setting (if it is not overridden by a loss of signal or loss of frame condition).

Note that hotswap does not trigger a nonvolatile record update. So, a subsequent module reboot might change the timing setting because the last known setting might be different from the nonvolatile record.

3.5.4 Line Buildout

The line buildout parameter is configured to meet the needs of the application. In LAN applications, the line buildout is usually not important and not configurable. The default value of the line buildout parameter should allow the entire range of media options in most LAN applications.

In WAN applications for North America, manual control of the line buildout parameter is sometimes necessary for T1 and T3 media. For T1 and T3 media, the default values shown are sufficient for all supported lengths for connections between DIGI-TAL equipment and their recommended cables.

The values of the line buildout parameters for different PHY types are shown in Table 3–5.

A Media Connection Information

This appendix describes the attachment and removal of connectors for each type of physical media interface used in a DIGITAL ATM modPHY card. It also contains cable information for each media type.

A.1 Connecting MMF and SMF Media

This section describes the media connection information for multimode fiber (MMF) and single-mode fiber (SMF) connections.

A.1.1 Attaching Cables and Connectors

Perform these steps to attach the cables and loopback connectors to the ATM mod-PHY card.

- 1. Remove the dust caps from the PHY port and cable.
- 2. Line up the transmit cable connector with the transmit port and the receive cable connector with the receive port. Insert the connectors, ensuring that the key is correctly positioned (see Figure A–1).

Note

Make sure that the bend radius of any fiber-optic cable is 1 inch (2.5 cm) or greater. To avoid optical power loss, do not touch the fiber ends.




Figure A-1 Attaching and Removing MMF and SMF Cables and Connectors

A.1.2 Removing Cables and Connectors

Perform these steps to remove the cables and loopback connectors.

- 1. Pull the connector from the PHY port.
- 2. Replace the dust caps on the connector and the PHY port.

A.1.3 Cables

Information about MMF and SMF cables is provided in this section.

A.1.3.1 MMF Cable Specifications

The MMF cables should adhere to these specifications:

- EIA/TIA 492-AAAA
- 62.5/125 µm
- SC connector
- 0 through 2 km (standard cable plant)
- 0 through 9 dB loss at 1300 nm (UNI V3.1, ATM User-Network Interface Specification)

or

```
0 through 11 dB loss at 1300 nm (ANSI X3.166-1990, FDDI PMD)
```

Connection distances for OC-3 above 2 km using $62.5/125 \mu$ m fiber can be operated correctly as long as the following conditions are met:

- $L \le 4 \text{ km}$
- $8 \text{ dB} > (A \times L + CL + SM)$

where

- A Is attenuation for each km of fiber in dB/km. This value is typically 1 to 2 dB/km.
- L Is the length of the link in km.
- CL Are the connector losses in dB (includes all connectors except those on the modPHY card).
- SM Is the splice margin reserved for future repairs of fiber link in dB. This value is typically 0.5 dB.

Connections for OC-3 using 50/125 or $100/140 \,\mu$ m fiber can be operated correctly as long as the cable plant meets or exceeds the requirements given in the ANSI X3.166-1990, FDDI PMD standard.

A.1.3.2 MMF Cables

The following MMF cables are available from DIGITAL:

Cable Description	Order Number
ST-SC, MM, Dual Fiber-Optic Cables	BN34A-xx
SC-SC, MM, Dual Fiber-Optic Cables	BN34B- <i>xx</i>

where *xx* represents the cable length. The available cable lengths are described in the *OPEN DECconnect Applications Guide*.

A.1.3.3 SMF Cable Specifications

The SMF cables must be dispersion-unshifted and should adhere to these specifications:

- EIA/TIA 492-CAAA
- 9/125 μm
- 0 through 15 km (Bellcore TR-NWT-000253, Intermediate Reach-1, OC3)
- 0 through 15 dB loss at 1300 nm

Connection distances for OC-3 above 15 km are beyond the requirements of Bellcore TR-NWT-000253, but can be operated correctly as long as either of the following conditions are met:

• For links up to 40 km in length,

 $15 \text{ dB} \ge (A \times L + CL + SM)$

• For links up to 60 km in length,

 $14 \text{ dB} \ge (A \times L + CL + SM)$

where

- A Is attenuation for each km of fiber in dB/km. This value is typically 0.2 to 0.4 dB/km.
- L Is the length of the link in km.
- CL Are the connector losses in dB (includes all connectors except those on the modPHY card).
- SM Is the splice margin reserved for future repairs of fiber link in dB. This value is typically 0.5 dB.

Patch cables should have SC connectors on one end for connection to the modPHY card and the other end should have connectors that meet the needs of the fiber plant or the attaching device.








Figure A-4 Attaching and Removing T1 or E1 Cables

B.1 MMF Ports

The multimode fiber (MMF) ports adhere to the following optical specifications:

- Transmit power level, -20 dbm minimum
- Receive power level, -31 dbm minimum

B.2 SMF Ports

The single-mode fiber (SMF) ports adhere to the following optical specifications:

- Transmit power level, -15 dbm minimum
- Receive power level, -31 dbm minimum
- Transmitter meets IEC 825 Class I safety requirements

B.3 T3 Ports

This section describes the interface specifications for the T3 ports.

The BNC connectors on the modPHY card can provide connection of the cable shield to the chassis and to an earth reference. The modPHY card is provided in the following configuration:

- Transmit connector referenced to chassis
- Receive connector isolated from chassis (at low frequency)

The T3 receive connector can be referenced to the chassis by adding a hex nut to the receive connector. The T3 transmit connector must always be referenced to the chassis.

B.4 E3 Ports

This section describes the interface specifications for the E3 ports.

The BNC connectors on the modPHY card can provide connection of the cable shield to the chassis and to an earth reference. The modPHY card is provided in the following configuration:

- Transmit connector referenced to chassis
- Receive connector isolated from chassis (at low frequency)

The E3 modPHY card is provided with insulating and conductive washers. To isolate either connector from the chassis, place an insulating washer between the metal washer and the chassis. To reference either connector to the chassis, remove the isolation washer. The E3 receive connector is provided with two isolation washers, one of which can be used to isolate the transmit connector.





B.6.2 Connector Earth Reference for E1

The connectors on the modPHY can provide connection of the cable shield to the chassis and to an earth reference. The modPHY card is provided in the following configuration:

- Receive connector (pin 3) is isolated from chassis
- Transmit connector (pin 6) is always referenced to chassis

The E1 receive shield can be referenced to the chassis by reconfiguring a jumper named J10.
