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Preface P

The DIGITALTM ServerWORKSTM Manager Enterprise Management Integration Guide provides networking and information systems professionals with the information needed to integrate DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager into an enterprise management solution.

This guide describes

- Installing ServerWORKS integration components within each supported enterprise management environment
- Discovering and managing DIGITAL servers, DIGITAL clusters, and Microsoft clusters
- Gaining access to the DIGITAL Management Information Bases (MIBs)
- Configuring and forwarding traps from DIGITAL devices to the enterprise manager's console
- Using ServerWORKS tools such as System Browser and Alarm Configuration

Use this guide in conjunction with the *DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide*. The installation and user guide provides more detailed information about the Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP) and the use of ServerWORKS features.

Related Information

To integrate ServerWORKS Manager effectively with an enterprise management solution, you should be familiar with

- Hardware and software prerequisites for the enterprise manager
- The user interface of the enterprise manager's console
- The documentation set for the enterprise manager

In addition, this manual assumes that you are familiar with TCP/IP networking and the Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP).



Note: Appendixes C and D contain information that advanced users of ServerWORKS Manager or an enterprise manager may find useful. This information should be used with care.

Conventions Used in This Guide

The terms "Select" and "Choose" are used frequently in the procedures described in this guide. Both terms refer to specific mouse pointer or keyboard operations:

- Select—Move the mouse pointer to an item (icon, command, name) and single-click the mouse button, or use the specified set of keyboard keys to indicate a choice.
- Choose—Move the mouse pointer to an item and double-click the mouse button, or use the specified set of keyboard keys to start an action on the selected item.

Preface

DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager provides server administrators with a set of comprehensive tools for operating work group and departmental networks reliably. ServerWORKS expands your existing network management capabilities when it is integrated into your enterprise manager.

This chapter details the benefits of DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager when it is integrated with an enterprise manager. This chapter addresses these topics:

- Integration with enterprise and network management solutions
- Levels of integration
- Basic concepts of ServerWORKS Manager integration

As a standalone management tool, ServerWORKS Manager discovers, monitors, and enables you to troubleshoot devices that support the Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP). You can set environmental alarms on servers and you can track their performance over time. Devices you can manage include:

- DIGITAL and non-DIGITAL servers and clusters
- Network devices such as routers, bridges, and hubs

When components of ServerWORKS Manager are integrated with other tools it provides the power of full enterprise management.

Integration with Enterprise and Network Management Solutions

Integrating DIGITAL ServerWORKs Manager with an enterprise or network management tools means you can effectively manage DIGITAL devices in large, heterogeneous computing environments. ServerWORKS Manager interoperates with the enterprise manager, providing critical and exact information to the management console.

You use the familiar interface of the network or enterprise management solution to accomplish the following tasks:

- Discover DIGITAL servers, DIGITAL NT clusters, and Microsoft NT clusters and display them on network maps
- Use DIGITAL MIB applications to display information
- Enable intelligent monitoring of DIGITAL devices
- Run the ServerWORKS Manager System Browser (NT only)
- Configure alarms and traps (NT only)
- Browse DIGITAL device events

ServerWORKS Manager integrates with the enterprise and network management packages described in Table 1-1.

Levels of Integration

The level of ServerWORKS Manager integration that you can achieve depends on the capabilities of the tool that you want to integrate it with. Some tools support maximum integration, while others support a minimal level of integration.

Maximum Integration

Maximum integration means you can

- Discover, display, and manage DIGITAL devices from the enterprise manager's network topology map.
- Run the ServerWORKS Manager System Browser and Alarm Configuration tools (on X86-based NT platforms only).



Note: HP-UX and DIGITAL UNIX users can view system information by running macros from the new DIGITAL pull down menu, which is added to their enterprise manager. These users can view alarms for DIGITAL servers from the Event Browser of their enterprise manager. First they must configure traps and trap destinations.

You can achieve maximum integration with these tools:

- HP® OpenView Network Node Manager
- Tivoli TME10 NetView
- CA® Unicenter TNG

You can also achieve a high level of integration with Compaq Insight Manager, but the implementation differs from what is described in this section. Compaq Insight Manager integration is described in Chapter 5 "Integrating with Compaq Insight Manager."

Minimum Integration

Minimum integration enables you to:

- Forward SNMP traps to any other SNMP-compliant application
- Define DIGITAL servers as a specific object type or device class within an application
- Compile DIGITAL MIBs into another management application

This is the level of integration that you can achieve with Novell ManageWise.

Basic Concepts of ServerWORKS Manager Integration

ServerWORKS Manager is designed to help you get optimum performance and reliability from work group and departmental networks containing DIGITAL servers and other SNMP-compliant resources. If your goal is to manage large networks or an entire enterprise, you can integrate ServerWORKS Manager with tools designed specifically for that purpose. You may already, in fact, have standardized on such a tool. Integration offers the capabilities of those tools — plus the level of system manageability that ServerWORKS Manager provides.

Integrating ServerWORKS Manager with your enterprise manager gives more detailed information about DIGITAL devices than you would otherwise have. This information is available by:

- Choosing from new DIGITAL menu options
- Selecting new DIGITAL icons
- Using the ServerWORKS Manager System Browser (X86-based NT platforms only).

DIGITAL Servers, Agents, and MIBs

A DIGITAL server is defined as a managed system that is running the full set of DIGITAL agents. Agents are software programs installed on managed systems that collect and measure system data, transmitting the data gathered to the management tool console. Table 1-2 describes the set of DIGITAL agents. This set includes a group of specialized agents that transmit data to the Compaq Insight Manager console.

Table 1-2 DIGITAL Agents

Agent	Monitors
Server System (svrSys)	Server configuration, status, and environmental settings.
Server Management (srvMgmt)	Alarm threshold settings, reporting alarm conditions to the network management console.
NT Cluster Management (ntcMgt)	DIGITAL NT clusters V1.1, checking the status of the cluster software and the names of the nodes that are members of the cluster.
Server Cluster (svrClu)	DIGITAL cluster products and Microsoft NT clusters.
Server NT Cluster (svrNtc)	DIGITAL cluster products and Microsoft NT clusters.
Compaq Agents for DIGITAL Servers	DIGITAL servers for Compaq Insight Manager, enabling Insight Manager to query and manage DIGITAL servers.

When you install the integration components of ServerWORKS Manager, you automatically load DIGITAL Management Information Bases (MIBs) into the enterprise manager. The enterprise manager can then discover and display DIGITAL servers on a management console's topology map. The console can also issue SNMP requests to agents located on those objects.

A server agent performs these operations:

- **Get** and **Get Next** retrieve data from a managed object and send it to the management console
- Set changes the value of a variable associated with a managed object
- Trap sends a message to the management console when a change or an error occurs on the object.

For more information about SNMP and DIGITAL MIBs, refer to the DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide.

Alarms and Minimal Health

When you install ServerWORKS Manager agents on DIGITAL servers and clusters running NT or Netware, you are providing an early warning system for problem detection. This is the ServerWORKS Manager minimal health feature. The ServerWORKS Manager agents provide out-of-the-box configuration of alarms for server components such as fans and disks. The minimal health agent sets alarms for environmental conditions — power supplies, voltage, fans, and temperature – and for status on processors, disks, and memory components.

For information about installing the ServerWORKS Manager agents, refer to the *DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide*. These agents must have been installed on DIGITAL servers prior to integration.

Intelligent Monitoring

ServerWORKS Manager agents gather server and component information intelligently. Instead of relying on constant polling from the management console, agents that are installed on managed systems interrogate themselves and notify the console when a unit reaches an alarm threshold or alarm state, saving considerable network bandwidth.

DIGITAL Device Information

ServerWORKS Manager integration changes the user interface of your enterprise solution so that you can obtain exact information about DIGITAL devices.

ServerWORKS Manager adds a DIGITAL menu option to the HP OpenView and Tivoli TME10 NetView interfaces. This menu option gives you access to detailed information about DIGITAL devices. Under CA Unicenter TNG, DIGITAL options are available from a pop up menu when you click the right mouse button on a DIGITAL device.


The DIGITAL menu contains the options described in Table 1-3.

Table 1-3 DIGITAL Menu Options

Menu Option	Purpose
Discover	Discovers DIGITAL managed systems.
Alarm Configuration	Sets alarms on DIGITAL servers (available only on X86-based NT systems with DIGITAL agents installed).
System Browser	Provides information about both static and dynamic characteristics of DIGITAL servers (available only on X86-based NT systems with DIGITAL agents installed).
Environment	Displays information about a server's cooling system, power supplies, thermal sensors, and voltage sensors. This macro provides the way for users on Unix platforms to view environment information. For NT users of HP OpenView and Tivoli TME 10 Netview, it is available as an alternative way of looking at information.

Menu Option	Purpose
Memory	Displays information about an object's memory configuration. This macro provides the way for users on Unix platforms to view memory information. For NT users of HP OpenView and Tivoli TME 10 Netview, it is available as an alternative way of looking at information.
Storage	Displays information about partitions, physical and logical devices, and file systems This macro provides the way for users on Unix platforms to view storage information. For NT users of HP OpenView and Tivoli TME 10 Netview, it is available as an alternative way of looking at information.
System	Displays information about cluster groups, cluster members, firmware, processors, and field replaceable units (FRU). This macro provides the way for users on Unix platforms to view system information. For NT users of HP OpenView and Tivoli TME 10 Netview, it is available as an alternative way of looking at information.
Graphs	Provides charts of statistical information; for example, you can view charts about voltage, temperature, file system use, processor load, packets discarded, and packet errors.
	Some of the information available from the DIGITAL menu is also available from OpenView and NetView menus. The DIGITAL menu, however, presents the information in more detail. For example, under HP OpenView, if you highlight a DIGITAL server and click Edit → Object Properties → IP Map, you view information as shown in Figure 1-1.

This window displays general information about the server, including the interface and its type.

In contrast, if you select a DIGITAL server and click DIGITAL \rightarrow System Browser and select any of the tabs shown you view a more detailed description of the network interface, as in Figure 1-2.

You can integrate DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager into an environment that uses HP OpenView as its enterprise management solution. Integration gives you the ability to monitor and manage DIGITAL servers and NT clusters through the OpenView Network Node Manager.

To integrate ServerWORKS Manager with OpenView, refer to the topics and tasks described in this chapter:

- Installing ServerWORKS Manager components
- Learning what you can manage
- Discovering and managing DIGITAL objects
- Displaying server information
- Configuring traps and trap destinations
- Browsing DIGITAL server events

This chapter describes integration with OpenView running on X86-based Windows NT consoles and on HP-UX consoles.

Installing ServerWORKS Manager Components

To be sure you are ready to install the ServerWORKS Manager components, you should understand the goals and prerequisites for the installation.



Note: The installation instructions presented in this chapter assume that SNMP is installed on both the network management console and on the DIGITAL devices that you want to manage. For information about installing SNMP, refer to the documentation for your Windows NT or HP-UX operating system.

Goals of the Installation

You run an automated installation script to integrate ServerWORKS into OpenView Network Node Manager. The goals of the installation procedure are to accomplish the following tasks:

- Load DIGITAL MIB files
 - Server System MIB (svrsys.mib) which provides access to basic server configuration information
 - Server Management MIB (svrmgt.mib) which provides access to the instrumentation in the DIGITAL agent, including the ability to monitor and detect thresholds
 - Cluster Management MIB (ntcmgt.mib) which provides the ability to manage DIGITAL clusters
 - Server Cluster MIB (svrclu.mib) which provides information about DIGITAL cluster products and Microsoft NT clusters
 - Server NT Cluster MIB (svrntc.mib) which provides information about DIGITAL cluster products and Microsoft NT clusters

P ₁	Note: The three cluster MIBs differ in how they are implemented. Use
	the OpenView MIB Browser tool to determine which MIB or MIBs is
	relevant to your enterprise.

- Install DIGITAL icons
- Modify the OpenView menu bar by adding a DIGITAL menu item
- Install trap files
- Add MIB applications
- Add DIGITAL Server OIDs to the data collector
- Install the ServerWORKS System Browser (on NT only)
- Install the ServerWORKS Alarm Configuration utility (on NT only)

Prerequisites for the Installation

Before you integrate ServerWORKS 4.0 with HP OpenView Network Node Manager, make sure you meet the software prerequisites.



Note: In addition to the software prerequisites listed in this section, you should be aware of the minimum hardware requirements to run HP OpenView. Refer to your HP OpenView documentation for this information.

You may also want to familiarize yourself with the hardware and software requirements for a complete ServerWORKS installation. Refer to the *DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide*.

On an X86-based NT Console

To integrate ServerWORKS on an NT console requires:

- ServerWORKS CD
- Windows NT 4.0 (on an X86 processor)
- HP OpenView 5.01
- 30MB of disk space
- TCP/IP network protocol
- SNMP service

To verify that TCP/IP and SNMP are installed:

- 1. Access the OpenView application.
- 2. Click the SNMP nodes from the subnet map.
- 3. Choose Fault \rightarrow Test IP/TCP/SNMP.

Make sure that DIGITAL agents are installed on the devices you want to manage through OpenView. For information about installing DIGITAL agents, refer to the *DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide*.

On an HP-UX Console

To integrate ServerWORKS on an HP-UX console requires:

- HP UX 10.20
- HP OpenView 5.01
- ServerWORKS CD
- TCP/IP network protocol
- SNMP service
- 5 MB of disk space

To verify that networking and SNMP are installed, refer to the HP-UX documentation and:

- 1. Access OpenView.
- 2. Verify that Network is available.
- 3. Verify SNMP on a node known to have SNMP installed.

Make sure that DIGITAL agents are installed on the devices you want to manage through OpenView. For information about installing DIGITAL agents, refer to the DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide.

Installing on NT

To install the ServerWORKS components on an X86-based NT console, follow these steps:

- 1. Log on to the console using the account used to monitor the system.
- 2. Close all programs that are running, including HP OpenView, mail programs, and the Microsoft Office shortcut bar.
- 3. Insert the ServerWORKS Manager CD in the CD drive of the console system.

As soon as the CD is engaged, the main installation screen appears. This screen prompts you to select the language you want to use to install ServerWORKS components.

If it does not appear, follow these steps:

- a. From the desktop, click the Start menu.
- b. Choose Run. Enter the following path:


```
<cd-rom drive>:\Autoplay.exe
```

4. On the language selection screen, choose English. ServerWORKS integration is not available in other languages.

The ServerWORKS component installation screen appears.

- Click the ServerWORKS Console Integration button.
 The ServerWORKS Console Integration screen appears.
- 6. Click the HP OpenView/ServerWORKS button.
- 7. Follow the remaining prompts to complete the installation of the ServerWORKS integration components.

Figure 2-1 ServerWORKS Console Integration Screen



As the installation script runs, it displays messages telling you what is being installed. The installation script creates two log files: SWInstall.log and SWInstallErr.log. When the script finishes, it displays a message telling you whether the installation succeeded. You are prompted to view the log files.



Note: The log files are deleted after you complete the installation. If the installation script encounters an error while it is running, it halts and prompts you to view the log files.

Confirming the Installation

To confirm the installation, follow these steps:

- 1. Start OpenView at your management console.
- 2. Verify that the DIGITAL menu is present on the menu bar.

- 3. Select Edit \rightarrow Find \rightarrow Object By Attribute.
- 4. Verify that these attributes appear in the list of Object attributes:
 - DECsvrClusterType
 - DECsvrQuery Type
 - DECsvrSysType

To find DIGITAL servers by attribute, see "Discovering DIGITAL Servers," a subsequent section of this chapter.

Uninstalling ServerWORKS Manager from an NT System

ServerWORKS Manager is tightly integrated with HP OpenView. As a result, if you need to uninstall ServerWORKS Manager integration components, DIGITAL strongly recommends that you uninstall HP OpenView. Uninstalling HP OpenView removes ServerWORKS Manager integration components. You can then reinstall OpenView.

If you choose not to follow the DIGITAL recommendation, an uninstall of ServerWORKS Manager components requires you to:

- Run an uninstall batch file
- Remove the ServerWORKS Manager database from the Registry
- Remove OID_TO_SYM and OID_TO_TYPE mapping entries

To Run the Uninstall Batch File

In the OpenView subdirectory on the ServerWORKS Manager CD, locate and run uninstal.bat.

The uninstall batch file attempts to restore your system to the state it was before you installed ServerWORKS Manager. However, you must manually remove the database and the mapping entries.

To Remove the ServerWORKS Manager Database from the Registry

- 1. In the Control Panel, double-click the ODBC icon.
- Click the System DSN tab.
- 3. Select the SWMgrDB entry.
- 4. Click Remove. You are prompted to make sure you want to delete SWMgrDB.
- 5. Click Yes.

To Remove OID_TO_SYM Entries

- 1. In OpenView\conf, select the file oid_to_sym.
- 2. Open the file in a text editor such as Notepad.
- 3. Find and delete the following lines:

```
1.2.6.1.4.1.311.1.1.3.1.1:Computer:WindowsNT # Windows NT Workstation
```

```
 1.2.6.1.4.1.311.1.1.3.1.2 \hbox{:Computer:WindowsNT $\#$ Windows NT Server }
```

```
1.2.6.1.4.1.311.1.1.3.1.3:Computer:WindowsNT # Windows NT Domain Controller"
```

4. Save the file.

To Remove OID_TO_TYPE entries

- 1. In OpenView\conf, find the file oid_to_type.
- 2. Open the file in a text editor such as Notepad.
- 3. Find the following line:

```
1.3.6.1.4.1.311.1.1.3.1.*::Windows NT:
```

4. Replace it with this line:

```
1.3.6.1.4.1.311.1.1.3.1::Windows NT:
```

5. Save the file.

Installing on HP-UX

The HPUNIX directory or your ServerWORKS CD contains two files that install the integration components of ServerWORKS: install.sh and DECHPOV.tar.

Before you run the installation script, review the software prerequisites described previously in this chapter.

The install program uses temporary disk space on the HP UX system. When the installation is complete, this space is recovered.

To install the ServerWORKS components on HP-UX, follow these steps:

- 1. Log on to the console as root. OpenView services startup automatically.
- 2. If the OpenView Network Node Manager interface is running, shut it down.
- 3. On the CD access the HPUNIX directory. Copy the DECHPOV.tar file from the CD to /tmp. Enter the following commands:

```
cd /tmp
cp DECHPOV.tar
```

4. Untar the DECHPOV.tar file. Enter the following command:


```
tar -xvf DECHPOV.tar
```

5. Go to the OpenView directory. Enter the following command:

```
cd /tmp/OpenView
```

 Run the install shell script ./install.sh. As the installation program runs, you are prompted to verify configuration and setup information.

As the installation script runs, it displays messages telling you what it is installing. The installation script creates two log files: SWInstall.log and SWInstallErr.log. When the script finishes, you are prompted to view the log files.





- 4. Verify that these attributes appear in the list of Object attributes:
 - DECsvrClusterType
 - DECsvrQuery Type
 - DECsvrSysType

Uninstalling ServerWORKS from HP-UX

To uninstall ServerWORKS from HP-UX system, follow these steps:

- Log on to the console using an account with administrator privileges.
- 2. If OpenView is running, close it.
- 3. Insert the ServerWORKS Manager CD into your CD drive.
- 4. Locate and run uninstal.bat in the OpenView subdirectory on the ServerWORKS Manager CD.

The uninstall batch file attempts to restore your system to the state it was before you installed ServerWORKS. It does not, however, remove DIGITAL OIDs from the data collector configuration file.

- To remove the DIGITAL OIDs, select Options → Data Collection & Thresholds: SNMP. And highlight the following OIDs. Select Suspend to end their use.
 - HrProcessor Load
 - HrStorageUsed
 - SvrPowerSensorReading
 - SvrThSensorReading

accomplish these tasks:

- Configure alarms and traps (NT only)
- Run the ServerWORKS System Browser (NT only)
- Display server information using DIGITAL macros:
 Environment, Memory, Network, Storage, System, and Graphs



Now when you work with the OpenView Event Categories window, you see a button for DIGITAL Server Events. The color of the button reflects the most severe unacknowledged event. When you click on this button, you display events received from a DIGITAL managed system.

For information about the colors of the buttons in the Event Categories window, refer to the HP OpenView *Using Network Node Manager Guide*.

Discovering and Managing DIGITAL Objects

When you start OpenView Network Node Manager, DIGITAL servers and clusters are discovered automatically and are displayed on the network map.

DIGITAL devices are represented on your network map by special icons. You can work with these icons much as you would with other symbols on the map. Table 2-1 lists and describes the DIGITAL icons.

Table 2-1 DIGITAL Icons

Icon	Represents
DIGITAL	A DIGITAL Alpha-based server
OUTAL Cluster	A DIGITAL Server cluster
DIGITAL III Intel	A DIGITAL Intel-based server

You can manage DIGITAL devices through the DIGITAL menu. You can also use HP OpenView tools. Examples of what you can do include:

- Discover DIGITAL objects on demand
- Find DIGITAL objects by attribute
- Manage devices using the DIGITAL MIB
- Create DIGITAL-specific submaps

Discovering DIGITAL Objects on Demand

Although DIGITAL objects are discovered automatically when you start OpenView, you may find it useful to discover them on demand, updating your open submap as required. For example, you may want to locate servers that were recently added.

To discover all the DIGITAL servers on your network or subnetwork:

- 1. Open an existing map or create a new map. Refer to the *HP*OpenView Using Network Node Manager Guide for information about this task.
- 2. Click DIGITAL \rightarrow Discover.


The discovery process uses the conditions set up for OpenView. See the *HP OpenView Using Network Node Manager Guide* for more information.

Finding DIGITAL Servers by Attribute

Searching by attribute offers a quick way to locate a server by a specific attribute such as processor type or network address. To quickly find DIGITAL servers on an OpenView submap, follow these steps:

- Open an existing map or create a new map. Refer to the HP OpenView manuals for information about this task.
- On NT, click Edit → Find → Object by Attribute.
 On HP-UX, click Locate → Objects → By Attribute.
- 3. From the Object Attributes list, select DECsvrSysType. (See Figure 2-4).
- 4. Choose a value from the Select One Value list. For example, choose DIGITAL Intel Server.
- Click Apply to discover the servers that match the attribute and value
- 6. From the Located and Highlighted list, select those servers with submaps that you want to display and click Open.

Managing Devices Using the DIGITAL MIB

SNMP MIBs define data structures that organize and provide access to state information or control points on network devices. The DIGITAL MIBs are designed to integrate the status of DIGITAL devices, or to activate their control logic. The DIGITAL MIBs are accessed through HP OpenView Network Node Manager. From here you can query and set MIB variables on DIGITAL devices.

To use the MIB to manage a DIGITAL device:


- 1. Select a DIGITAL device on an OpenView map.
- 2. On NT, click Tools \rightarrow SNMP MIB Browser.

On HP-UX, click Misc \rightarrow SNMP MIB Browser.

Figure 2-5 shows a region of the Browse MIB window on NT.

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3. On the Browse MIB window, navigate the MIB tree.

Use this path:

- 4. From svrSystem, choose one of these MIBs to browse:
 - svrBaseSystem (base system)
 - svrmgt (server management)
 - ntcmgt (cluster management)
 - svrclu.mib (cluster management)
 - svrntc.mib (cluster management)
- 5. Follow standard HP OpenView procedures to query and set MIB variables. Figure 2-6 shows the results of a querying the svrCpuTable.

Creating DIGITAL-Specific Submaps

You may find it useful to group DIGITAL devices in their own submap. To create a DIGITAL-specific submap, follow these steps:

1. Select the DIGITAL servers you want to group.

One way to select the servers is to follow the procedure in the section "Finding DIGITAL Servers by Attribute." Highlight the servers you want to group, then click the Select button. Refer to Figure 2-4.

- 2. Click Edit \rightarrow Copy.
- 3. Click Map \rightarrow Submap \rightarrow New.
- 4. Respond to the prompts presented by the New Submap Wizard.
- 5. Click Edit \rightarrow Paste to display the icons on the new submap.

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


Figure 2-7 DIGITAL-Specific Submap Window

Displaying Server Information


Using the DIGITAL macros, you can display the following server information:

The \P DIGITAL object detail icon also accesses the information icon.


Figure 2-8 Using the DIGITAL Menu to Display Device Information

This information is available from the DIGITAL menu, as shown in Figure 2-8.


Figure 2-9 Using DIGITAL Icons to Display Device Information

- 1. Select a DIGITAL icon.
- 2. Click DIGITAL and then choose a variable.

The following tables describe each of the parameters available in the variables.

From DIGITAL → Environment, Select	To Display
Cooling System	The status of cooling systems.
Power Supplies	The status of power supplies installed on the server.
Thermal Sensors	Values obtained from the server's thermal sensors.
Voltage Sensors	Information about the voltage sensors on a server; for example, the nominal voltage rating and the sensors' present reading of voltage or current.

Table 2-3 Memory Variables

From DIGITAL → Memory, Select	To Display
Components	Information about the server's memory components; for example, the type and amount of memory.
Overview	General information about the memory on the server; for example, the amount of total physical memory and the amount of available physical memory.
Slots	The type and number of slots in use and the number of slots available.

Table 2-4 Network Variables

From DIGITAL → Network, Select	To Display
Interface	Information about the network interface components on the server; for example, the interface bandwidth (speed) and the maximum packet size (maximum transmission unit or MTU) that the interface can send or receive.
Statistics	Transmission and reception statistics.

You can also display network information using the DIGITAL \to Graphs option. For more information, refer to DIGITAL \to Graphs.

Table 2-5 Storage Variables

From DIGITAL → Storage, Select	To Display
File System	Information about the file systems in use.
Devices	Information about the physical storage devices on a server; for example the type of device and its capacity.
Disk Partitions	Information about how disks are partitioned on a server.
Storage	Information about logical storage devices on a server; for example, virtual memory.

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Table 2-6 System Variables

From DIGITAL → System, Select	To Display
Cluster Groups	If a server belongs to a cluster, the name of the cluster group and other devices that belong to the cluster.
Cluster Members	The server's cluster name.
Devices	The status of devices installed on the server: Unknown; Running; Warning; Testing; Down
Firmware	The version of firmware on a server.
Field Replaceable Units (FRU)	Information about field replaceable units installed on the server, including the device type, its history, part number and serial number.
Miscellaneous	Miscellaneous system information, including the reason for the last system shutdown, if known.
Processors	Information about CPUs installed on the server and their most recent usage rates.

Table 2-7 Graphing Options from the DIGITAL menu

From DIGITAL → Graphs, Select	To Graph
Voltage	Voltage sensor readings on the server.
Temperature	Temperature readings on the server.
File System Usage	Percent of storage on the device.
Processor Load	Percent of processor utilized.
Octets	Total octets transmitted and received on each network interface on the server.
Non-Unicast Packets	Total non-unicast packets transmitted and received on each network interface.
Packets Discarded	Total number of packets discarded on all network interfaces on the server.
Packet Errors	The number of packets with error that each network interface has received.
Unknown Protocol Packets	The number of unknown protocol packets that each network interface has received.
Total Packets	The total unicast and non-unicast packets that all network interfaces on a server have received.
Non-Unicast Packets	The number of non-unicast packets that each interface on a server has transmitted.
Transmit Queue Length	The length of the transmit queue on each interface on a server.

Configuring Traps and Trap Destinations

Using SNMP traps, you can ensure that DIGITAL devices notify HP OpenView Network Node Manager when particular events occur.

The DIGITAL syrmgt.mib defines four levels of traps: high, medium, low, and informational. Each trap can indicate a variety of conditions depending on how a particular server agent is configured. Each of these traps has a unique trap ID.

HP OpenView defines five event categories: Error Events, Threshold Events, Status Events, Configuration Events, and Application Alert Events. Within each category, events are assigned one of five levels of severity. Table 2-8 compares DIGITAL trap and HP event levels.

Table 2-8 Trap and Event Levels in OpenView and ServerWORKS

OpenView	ServerWORKS
Critical	High
Major	Medium
Minor	Low
Warning	(no corresponding trap level)
Normal	Informational

To view DIGITAL traps in HP OpenView, you designate a ServerWORKS Manager Console as the trap destination; then configure the ServerWORKS Console to forward the trap to OpenView.

Designating the Trap Destination

To designate a ServerWORKS console as a trap destination:

- 1. Make sure that SNMP is configured as a service on each DIGITAL device where a ServerWORKS agent is installed.
- 2. Choose Tools → Trap Control from the ServerWORKS Manager Console or from Alarm Configuration.
- 3. Click the Remote Destination tab.
- 4. Enter the Host name (managed device name).
- 5. Choose one of the following:
 - Accept the default community (for example, Public for Windows NT).
 - Deselect the default option and enter Get Community and Set Community names.
- 6. Click Get Info to display the current community name and trap destination information for the host.
- 7. Specify the destination by community name. The destination is included in the trap message.

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Forwarding Traps

To configure the ServerWORKS Manager Console to forward the trap to an HP OpenView console:

- From the ServerWORKS Console menu, choose Tools→Trap Control
- 2. Click the Local Forwarding tab and perform the following tasks:
 - a. Enter the community name, if necessary. Public is the NT default community. You can change the community name, but the name you use applies to all forwarding destinations in the list.
 - b. Select Forward alarms as traps.
 - Click Get Info to see a list of the forwarding addresses for the selected community.
- 3. To add a forwarding address, click Add. On the Add dialog box, enter the Address and Port number. Then click OK.
- 4. Click Apply to enable the changes and Close to close the dialog box.

Note: For complete instructions about configuring SNMP on a
managed device and trap forwarding, refer to the DIGITAL
ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide.

Browsing DIGITAL Server Events


Whenever a ServerWORKS agent generates a trap, you can view information about it from the OpenView Event Categories window.

Viewing DIGITAL Server Events

To view DIGITAL agent traps:

- Make Event Categories the active window.
- 2. Click DIGITAL Server Events. The DIGITAL Server Events Browser Window is displayed, as shown in Figure 2-11.

The DIGITAL Server Events Browser window contains a scrolled list of events in chronological order with the most recent event last.

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For each event, you see the following information:

- Ack A checkbox indicating whether the event has been acknowledged. If the box is empty, the event is unacknowledged.
- Severity The trap level for the event.
- Date/Time The day, date, and time the event occurred.
- Source An identifier, such as the server name, for the device where the event occurred.
- Message A short statement about the event.


Filtering DIGITAL Server Events

You can filter traps received from DIGITAL devices so that you can focus on just those that are of immediate concern.

To filter events:

- From the DIGITAL Server Events Browser window, select View → Set Filters.
- Set the filter to show events that match any combination of these criteria:
 - Severity
 - Acknowledgement
 - Event type
 - Message string
 - After time/date
 - Before time/date
 - Source
- 3. Click OK to apply the filter.

For example, to see only unacknowledged events that occurred after a given time and date:

- 1. In the Match Acknowledgement region of the window, deselect Acknowledged.
- 2. Click the Message and Time tab
- 3. In the Match by Time region of the window, check Received on or After.
- 4. Select the time and date.

You can integrate DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager into an environment that uses Tivoli TME 10 NetView as its enterprise management framework. This integration extends your ability to monitor and manage DIGITAL servers and clusters through the NetView Console.

To integrate ServerWORKS Manager with NetView, refer to the topics and tasks described in this chapter:

- Installing ServerWORKS Manager components
- Learning what you can manage
- Discovering and managing DIGITAL objects
- Displaying server information
- Configuring traps and trap destinations

This chapter describes integration with NetView running on X86-based Windows NT and DIGITAL UNIX consoles.

Installing ServerWORKS Manager Components

To be sure you are ready to install the ServerWORKS Manager components, you should understand the goals and prerequisites for the installation.



Note: The installation instructions presented in this chapter assume that SNMP is installed on both the network management console and on the DIGITAL devices that you want to manage. For information about installing SNMP, refer to the documentation for your Windows NT or DIGITAL UNIX operating system.

Goals of the Installation

Run the automated installation script to integrate ServerWORKS into Tivoli TME 10 NetView. The goals of the installation procedure are to accomplish the following tasks:

• Load DIGITAL MIB files

- Server System MIB (svrsys.mib which provides access to basic server configuration information
- Server Management MIB (svrmgt.mib) which provides access to the instrumentation in the DIGITAL agent, including the ability to monitor and detect thresholds
- Cluster Management MIB (ntcmgt.mib) which provides the ability to manage DIGITAL clusters
- Server Cluster MIB (svrclu.mib) which provides information about DIGITAL cluster products and Microsoft NT clusters
- Server NT Cluster MIB (svrntc.mib) which provides information about DIGITAL cluster products and Microsoft NT clusters

<u> </u>	Note: The three cluster MIBs differ in how they are implemented. Use
	the MIB Browser tool to determine which MIB or MIBs is relevant to
	your enterprise.

- Install DIGITAL icons
- Modify the NetView menu bar by adding a DIGITAL menu
- Install trap files
- Add MIB applications
- Add DIGITAL Server OIDs to the data collector
- Install the ServerWORKS Manager System Browser (on NT only)
- Install the ServerWORKS Alarm Configuration utility (on NT only)

Prerequisites for the Installation

Before you integrate ServerWORKS 4.0 with Tivoli TME 10 NetView, make sure you comply with the software prerequisites listed in the following sections.



Note: In addition to the software prerequisites listed in this section, you should be aware of the minimum hardware requirements to run Tivoli TME 10 NetView. Refer to your Tivoli TME 10 NetView documentation for this information.

You may also want to familiarize yourself with the hardware and software requirements for a complete ServerWORKS installation. Refer to the *DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide*.

On an X86-based NT Console

Integration of ServerWORKS on an NT console requires:

- Windows NT 4.0 (on an X86 processor)
- Tivoli TME 10 NetView 5.0
- 30 MB free disk space
- TCP/IP network protocol
- SNMP services

To verify that TCP/IP and SNMP are installed:

- 1. Access the Tivoli application.
- 2. Select the SNMP nodes from the subnet map.
- Choose Test → Connectivity from the main menu to check for SNMP and TCP/IP connectivity.

Make sure that DIGITAL agents are installed on the devices you want to manage through Tivoli TME 10 NetView. For information about installing DIGITAL agents, refer to the DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide.

On a DIGITAL UNIX Console

Integration of ServerWORKS on a DIGITAL UNIX console requires:

- DIGITAL UNIX 4.2 or greater
- Tivoli TME 10 NetView 5.0
- TCP/IP network protocol
- SNMP
- 5 MB of disk space

To verify that networking and SNMP are installed, refer to the DIGITAL Unix documentation and:

- 1. Access the application.
- 2. Verify that Network is available.
- 3. Verify SNMP on a node known to have SNMP installed.

Make sure that DIGITAL agents are installed on the devices you want to manage through OpenView. For information about installing DIGITAL agents, refer to the DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide.

Installing on NT

To install the ServerWORKS components on an X86-based NT console, follow these steps:

- Log on to the console using an account with administrator privileges.
- 2. Close all programs that are running, including Tivoli TME 10 NetView, mail programs, and the Microsoft Office shortcut bar.
- 3. Insert the ServerWORKS Manager CD in the CD drive of the console system.

As soon as the CD is engaged, the main installation screen appears. This screen prompts you to select the language you want to use to install ServerWORKS components.

If it does not appear, follow these steps:

- a. From the desktop, click the Start menu.
- b. Choose Run. Enter the following path:


```
<cd-rom drive>:\Autoplay.exe
```

4. On the language selection screen, choose English. ServerWORKS integration is not internationalized.

The ServerWORKS Component Installation screen appears.

- Click the ServerWORKS Console Integration button.
 The ServerWORKS Console Integration screen appears.
- 6. Click the Tivoli TME 10 NetView/ServerWORKS button.
- 7. Follow the remaining prompts to complete the installation of the ServerWORKS integration components.

As the installation script runs, it displays messages telling you what is being installed. The installation script creates two log files: SWInstall.log and SWInstallErr.log. When the script finishes, it displays a message telling you whether the installation succeeded. You are prompted to view the log files.



Note: The log files are deleted after you complete the installation. If the installation script encounters an error while it is running, it halts and prompts you to view the log files.

Confirming the Installation

To confirm the installation follow these steps:

- 1. Start Tivoli TME 10 NetView on your management console.
- 2. Verify that the DIGITAL menu is present on the menu bar.

- 3. Select Edit \rightarrow Find \rightarrow Object By Attribute.
- 4. Verify that these attributes appear in the list of Object attributes:
 - DECsvrClusterType
 - DECsvrQuery Type
 - DECsvrSysType

To find DIGITAL servers by attribute, see "Discovering DIGITAL Servers," a subsequent section of this chapter.

Uninstalling ServerWORKS Manager from an NT System

ServerWORKS Manager is tightly integrated with Tivoli TME 10 NetView. As a result, if you need to uninstall ServerWORKS Manager integration components, DIGITAL strongly recommends that you uninstall Tivoli TME 10 NetView. Uninstalling Tivoli TME 10 NetView removes ServerWORKS Manager integration components. You can then reinstall NetView.

If you choose not to follow the DIGITAL recommendation, an uninstall of ServerWORKS Manager components requires you to:

- Run an uninstall batch file
- Remove the ServerWORKS Manager database from the Registry
- Remove OID TO SYM and OID TO TYPE mapping entries

To Run the Uninstall Batch File

In the NetView subdirectory on the ServerWORKS Manager CD, locate and run uninstal.bat.

The uninstall batch file attempts to restore your system to the state it was before you installed ServerWORKS Manager. However, you must manually remove the database and the mapping entries.

To Remove the ServerWORKS Manager Database from the Registry

- 1. In the Control Panel, double-click the ODBC icon.
- 2. Click the System DSN tab.
- 3. Select the SWMgrDB entry.
- 4. Click Remove. You are prompted to make sure you want to delete SWMgrDB.
- 5. Click Yes.

To Remove OID_TO_SYM Entries

- 1. In NetView\config, find the file oid_to_sym.
- 2. Open the file in a text editor such as Notepad.
- 3. Find and delete the following lines:

```
1.2.6.1.4.1.311.1.1.3.1.1:Computer:WindowsNT # Windows NT Workstation
```

```
 1.2.6.1.4.1.311.1.1.3.1.2 \hbox{:Computer:WindowsNT $\#$ Windows NT Server }
```

```
1.2.6.1.4.1.311.1.1.3.1.3:Computer:WindowsNT # Windows NT Domain Controller
```

4. Save the file.

To Remove OID_TO_TYPE entries

- 1. In NetView\config, find the file oid_to_type.
- 2. Open the file in a text editor such as Notepad.
- 3. Find the following line:

```
1.3.6.1.4.1.311.1.1.3.1.*::Windows NT:
```

4. Replace it with this line:

```
1.3.6.1.4.1.311.1.1.3.1::Windows NT:
```

5. Save the file.

Installing on DIGITAL UNIX

The DUNIX directory on your ServerWORKS Manager CD contains two files that you need to install the integration components of ServerWORKS: install.sh and DECHPOV.tar.

Before you run the run the installation script, review the software prerequisites described previously in this chapter.

The installation program uses temporary disk space on the DIGITAL UNIX system. When the installation is complete, this space is recovered.

To install the ServerWORKS components on DIGITAL UNIX, follow these steps:

- 1. Log on to the console as *root*.
- 2. Start NetView services.
- 3. Verify that there is at least 5 MB of free disk space in the file system where TME 10 NetView is installed.
- 4. Mount the CD on to the file system.
- 5. Stop the TME 10 NetView GUI.
- 6. Close all ovw sessions by running the command

```
OV_BIN/ovstop
```

7. Copy the DECPNV.tar file from the CD to /tmp. Enter the following command:

```
cp DECPNV.tar/tmp
```

8. Go to the /tmp directory. Enter the following command:

```
cd /tmp
```

9. Untar the DECPNV.tar file. Enter the following command:

```
tar -xvf DECPNV.tar
```

10. Go to the NetView directory. Enter the following command:

```
cd /tmp/NetView
```

11. Run the install shell script ./install.sh.

As the installation program runs, you are prompted to verify configuration and setup information.

As the installation script runs, it displays messages telling you what is being installed. The installation script creates two log files: SWInstall.log and SWInstallErr.log. When the script finishes, you are prompted to view the log files.



Note: The log files are deleted after the installation script finishes running. If the installation script encounters an error while it is running, it halts and prompts you to view the log files.

Confirming the Installation

To confirm the installation, follow these steps:

- 1. Start NetView on your management console.
- 2. Verify that the DIGITAL menu is present on the menu bar.

- 4. Verify that these attributes appear in the list of Object attributes:

To find DIGITAL servers by attribute, see "Discovering DIGITAL Servers," a subsequent section of this chapter.

Uninstalling ServerWORKS from DIGITAL UNIX

To uninstall ServerWORKS from a DIGITAL UNIX system, follow these steps:

- 1. Log on to the console in the root account.
- 2. If NetView is running, close it.
- 3. Insert the DIGITAL CD into your CD drive.
- 4. Locate and run uninstal.bat in the NetView subdirectory on the ServerWORKS Manager CD.

The uninstall batch file attempts to restore your system to the state it was in before you installed ServerWORKS. It does not, however, remove DIGITAL OIDs from the data collector configuration file.

- To remove the DIGITAL OIDs, select Options → Data Collection & Thresholds: SNMP.
- 6. Remove the following OIDs:
 - HrProcessor Load
 - HrStorageUsed
 - SvrPowerSensorReading
 - SvrThSensorReading

Learning What You Can Manage



When you integrate DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager with Tivoli TME 10 NetView, you gain access to the following DIGITAL tools through the new DIGITAL menu:

- Discovery
- ServerWORKS System Browser (NT X86-based consoles only)
- ServerWORKS Alarm Configuration tool (NT X86-based consoles only)
- DIGITAL macros: Environment, Memory, Network, Storage, System, and Graphs

To quickly access these tools:

- 1. On a NetView map, select a DIGITAL device.
- Click DIGITAL from the Main Menu bar and select the tool you want to use. To display the Alarm Configuration tool for example, click DIGITAL → Alarm Configuration.

Discovering and Managing DIGITAL Objects

When you start NetView, objects such as DIGITAL workstations, servers and clusters (objects) are discovered automatically and are displayed on the network map.

DIGITAL devices are represented on your network map by special icons. You can work with these icons much as you would with other symbols on the map. Table 3-1 lists and describes the DIGITAL icons.

Table 3-1 DIGITAL Object Icons

Icon	Represents
DIGITAL	DIGITAL Alpha-based Server running Windows NT or DIGITAL Unix
ALPHA OIGHTAL Cluster	DIGITAL Server Cluster

Discovering DIGITAL Objects on Demand

Although DIGITAL objects are discovered automatically when you start NetView, you may find it useful to discover them on demand, updating your open submap as needed.

To discover all DIGITAL servers on your network or subnetwork, follow these steps:

1. Start the NetView Console.

On NT, from the Start menu, click Programs \rightarrow NetView \rightarrow NetView Console.

- 2. On DIGITAL UNIX, at the prompt type pnv
- 3. Open an existing map or create a new map. Refer to Tivoli TME 10 NetView documentation for information about this task.
- 4. Navigate to the submap that is of interest to you.
- 5. Click DIGITAL \rightarrow Discover.

Finding DIGITAL Servers On NT

To find DIGITAL servers on NT, follow these steps:

- Open an existing map or create a new map. Refer to the NetView documentation for information about this process.
- 2. Click Edit \rightarrow Find. The Find window appears.
- 3. Select Find by = Object Type.
- 4. In the Type region of the window, click the Computer icon.
- 5. In the Subtype region of the window, click the icon for the type of system you want to find. For example, click the DECsvrIntel icon.
- 6. Click Apply.

Use this procedure to find DIGITAL managed systems of the type specified on your currently open submap.

Finding DIGITAL Servers On DIGITAL UNIX

To find DIGITAL servers with a specific attribute, follow these steps:

- Open an existing map or create a new map. Refer to the Tivoli TME NetView manuals for information about this task.
- 2. Click Locate \rightarrow Objects \rightarrow By Attribute.
- 3. From the Object Attributes list, select DECsvrSysType.
- 4. Choose a value from the Select One Value list; for example, DIGITAL Intel Server.
- 5. From the Object Attributes list, select DECsvrSysType.
- 6. Choose a value from the Select One Value list; for example, DIGITAL Intel Server.
- 7. Click Apply to discover the servers that match the attribute and value.
- 8. From the Located and Highlighted list, select those servers with submaps that you want to display and click Open.




Figure 3-4 NetView Locate by Attribute Window on DIGITAL UNIX





Displaying Server Information

Figure 3-6 Using the DIGITAL Menu to Display Device Information



Overview	General information about the memory on the server; for example, the amount of total physical memory and the amount of available physical memory.
Slots	The type and number of slots in use and the number of slots available.

From DIGITAL → Network, Select	To Display
Interface	Information about the network interface controllers on the server; for example, the interface bandwidth (speed) and the maximum packet size (maximum transmission unit or MTU) that the interface can send or receive.

You can also display network information using the DIGITAL \rightarrow Graphs option.



Configuring Traps and Trap Destinations

Using SNMP traps , you can ensure that DIGITAL devices notify the Tivoli TME10 NetView when particular events occur.

The DIGITAL syrmgt.mib defines four levels of traps: high, medium, low, and informational. Each trap can indicate a variety of conditions depending on how a particular server agent is configured. Each of these traps has a unique trap ID.

Tivoli defines six event categories: Critical Events, Major Events, Minor Events, Warning Events, and Indeterminate. Within each category, events are assigned a level of severity. Table 3-8 compares DIGITAL trap and NetView event levels.

Integrating with Tivoli TME 10 NetView

To send traps to Tivoli TME 10 NetView, follow these steps:

- 1. Make sure that SNMP is configured as a service on each DIGITAL device where a ServerWORKS agent is installed.
- 2. Designate a ServerWORKS Manager Console as the trap destination.
- 3. Configure the ServerWORKS Manager Console to forward the trap to a Tivoli TME 10 NetView console.

Note: For complete instructions on configuring SNMP on a managed
device and trap forwarding, refer to the DIGITAL ServerWORKS
Manager Installation and User Guide.



You can integrate DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager into an environment that uses CA Unicenter TNG as its enterprise management solution. Integration facilitates your ability to monitor and manage DIGITAL servers and NT clusters through the Unicenter TNG interface.

To integrate ServerWORKS with CA Unicenter TNG, refer to the topics and tasks described in this chapter:

- Installing ServerWORKS components
- Learning what you can manage
- Managing DIGITAL objects
- Configuring traps and trap destinations

You can integrate ServerWORKS Manager with CA Unicenter TNG on X86-based Windows NT consoles.

Installing ServerWORKS Components

To be sure you are ready to install the ServerWORKS components, you should understand the goals and prerequisites for the installation.

Note: The installation instructions presented in this chapter assume that SNMP is installed on both the network management console and on the DIGITAL devices that you want to manage. For information about installing SNMP, refer to your Windows NT documentation.


Goals of the Installation

You run an automated installation script to integrate ServerWORKS into CA Unicenter TNG. The goals of the installation procedure are to:

- Load DIGITAL MIB files
 - Server System MIB (svrsys.mib) which provides access to basic server configuration information
 - Server Management MIB (svrmgt.mib) which provides access to the instrumentation in the DIGITAL agent, including the ability to monitor and detect thresholds
 - Cluster Management MIB (ntcmgt.mib) which provides the ability to manage DIGITAL clusters
 - Server Cluster MIB (svrclu.mib) which provides information about DIGITAL cluster products and Microsoft NT clusters
 - Server NT Cluster MIB (svrntc.mib) which provides information about DIGITAL cluster products and Microsoft NT clusters

Note: The three cluster MIBs differ in how they are implemented. Use the MIB Browser tool to determine which MIB or MIBs is relevant to your enterprise.

- Install DIGITAL icons
- Create the classes and objects in the Unicenter TNG database that are needed to define DIGITAL servers
- Enable the identification of DIGITAL servers by adding Distributed State Machine policies and definitions
- Enable DIGITAL server to report status through a Finite State Machine
- Install trap files
- Install the ServerWORKS System Browser
- Install the ServerWORKS Alarm Configuration utility



Prerequisites for the Installation


Before you integrate ServerWORKS 4.0 with CA Unicenter TNG, make sure you meet the software prerequisites listed in this section.

Note: In addition to the software prerequisites listed in this section, you should be aware of the minimum hardware requirements to run CA Unicenter TNG. Refer to your CA documentation for this information.

You may also want to familiarize yourself with the hardware and software requirements for a complete ServerWORKS installation. Refer to the *DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide*. A qualified CA Unicenter TNG administrator should install the ServerWORKS integration components.

To integrate ServerWORKS with TNG, you need:

- Windows NT 4.0 (on an X86 processor)
- CA Unicenter TNG 2.1
- SQL Server 6.5
- TCP/IP network protocol
- SNMP



Integrating ServerWORKS Components

To install the ServerWORKS components on an NT console:

- 1. Log on to the console using an account with administrator privileges.
- 2. Close all programs that are running, including CA Unicenter TNG, mail programs, and the Microsoft Office shortcut bar.
- 3. Insert the ServerWORKS Manager in the CD drive of the console system.
- 4. From the Start menu, run setup.
- 5. Respond to the setup program prompts for the following information:
 - a) At the first prompt, enter the path for the CA Unicenter TNG directory on the management console. ServerWORKS installation setup will automatically default to the current version running. If you have both TNG V2.1 and V2.2 on your system enter the path name to TNG V2.1 here.
 - b) Next, enter the path where you want to install the ServerWORKS components. You are prompted to identify the root directory for the installation. The installation procedure automatically creates two directories under the root. These directories are DIGITAL and SWMGR.
 - The following example shows a typical ServerWORKS path:
 - C:\ProgramFiles\Digital\SWMGR
 - c) Enter the path to CA Unicenter TNG Common Object Repository (database).
 - d) Enter a User ID and Password for the repository.
 - As the installation script runs, it displays messages telling you what it is installing. The installation script creates two log files: SWInstall.log and SWInstallErr.log.
- 6. Restart your system.

Confirming the Installation

To confirm that the installation succeeded:

- 1. Start CA Unicenter TNG at your management console.
- In the CA Unicenter TNG program group, click Class Browser.
 A dialog box provides the path to the Common Object Repository.
- 3. Click OK.

The Unicenter TNG Class Browser window is displayed.

- 4. From TNG Root, click Managed Object \rightarrow Agent.
- 5. Verify that DigAgNT appears in the list of agents.
- 6. From TNG Root, click Managed Object \rightarrow Host.
- 7. Verify that Digital Server appears in the list of hosts.

Uninstalling ServerWORKS from an NT System

ServerWORKS Manager is tightly integrated with CA Unicenter TNG. As a result, if you need to uninstall ServerWORKS Manager integration components, DIGITAL strongly recommends that you uninstall Unicenter TNG. Uninstalling Unicenter TNG removes ServerWORKS Manager integration components. You can then reinstall Unicenter TNG.

If you choose not to follow the DIGITAL recommendation, you can run an uninstall script.

1. Locate and run uninstal.bat in the CA Unicenter TNG subdirectory on the ServerWORKS Manager CD.

The uninstall batch file attempts to restore your system to the state it was before you installed ServerWORKS. It does not, however, remove DIGITAL OIDs from the data collector configuration file.

- 2. Restore Unicenter TNG to its pre-ServerWORKS state:
 - a. Go to the TNG\bin directory.
 - b. Locate and run uninsttng.bat.

This restores the original Unicenter TNG files and rolls back any ServerWORKS changes to the Common Object Repository.

Learning What You Can Manage



When you integrate DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager with CA Unicenter TNG, you gain access to these tools:

- ServerWORKS System Browser
- ServerWORKS Alarm Configuration utility

To quickly access these tools:

- 1. On a CA Unicenter TNG map, select a DIGITAL device.
- Click the right mouse button. System Browser and Alarm Configuration are now choices on the pop up menu that is displayed.

The menu options are displayed as

- SW System Browser
- SW Alarm Config Tool

Managing DIGITAL Objects

When you start CA Unicenter TNG, DIGITAL servers and clusters are discovered automatically and are displayed on the network map. Initially, the DIGITAL devices are represented by NT server icons. As the discovery process continues, however, the devices are reclassified and they are represented by DIGITAL icons.

You can work with the DIGITAL icons much as you would with other symbols on the map. Table 4-1 lists and describes the DIGITAL icons.

Table 4-1 DIGITAL Icons

Icon	Represents
OIGITAL	DIGITAL Intel-based or Alpha-based Server
PISITAL	DIGITAL Agent

You can manage DIGITAL devices through the DIGITAL menu. You can also use Unicenter TNG tools. Examples of what you can do include:



Getting Device Status Using Node View

You can get status information about DIGITAL managed systems through a Unicenter TNG window.

- 1. Double-click the icon for the DIGITAL managed system you want to view.
- 2. Using the right mouse button, click the Digital System Agent icon.





Generating Reports about DIGITAL Devices

You can use the Unicenter TNG reporting tool to generate reports about DIGITAL devices. You can display the reports on your console, print the reports, or save them to a file.

To generate a report:

- 1. Select a DIGITAL device on a Unicenter TNG map.
- From the CA Unicenter TNG menu bar, click Report → Object by Class
- 3. In the Object Report by Class window, go to the Object Classes list.
- 4. Scroll through the list and select
 - DIGITAL Server to generate a report about servers
 - DigAgtNT to generate a report about DIGITAL agents



Configuring Traps and Trap Destinations

Using SNMP traps, you can ensure that DIGITAL devices notify CA Unicenter TNG when particular or exceptional events occur.

The DIGITAL syrmgt.mib defines four levels of traps: high, medium, low, and informational. Each trap can indicate a variety of conditions depending on how a particular server agent is configured. Each of these traps has a unique trap ID.

To view DIGITAL traps in CA Unicenter TNG, you designate a ServerWORKS Manager Console as the trap destination, then configure the ServerWORKS Console to forward the trap to TNG.

Designating the Trap Destination

To designate a ServerWORKS console as a trap destination:

- 1. Make sure that SNMP is configured as a service on each DIGITAL device where a ServerWORKS agent is installed.
- Choose Tools → Trap Control from the ServerWORKS Manager Console or from the Alarm Configuration utility.
- 3. Click the Remote Destination tab.
- 4. Enter the Host name (managed device name).
- 5. Choose one of the following:
 - Accept the default community (for example, Public for Windows NT).
 - Deselect the default option and enter Get Community and Set Community names.

- Click Get Info to display the current community name and trap destination information for the host.
- 7. Specify the destination by community name. The destination is included in the trap message.

Forwarding Traps

To configure the ServerWORKS Manager Console to forward the trap to a CA Unicenter TNG console

- 1. From the ServerWORKS Console menu, choose Tools \rightarrow Trap Control.
- 2. Click the Local Forwarding tab and perform the following tasks:
 - Enter the community name, if necessary. Public is the NT default community. You can change the community name, but the name you use applies to all forwarding destinations in the list.
 - b. Select Forward alarms as traps.
 - c. Click Get Info to see a list of the forwarding addresses for the selected community.
- 3. To add a forwarding address, click Add. On the Add dialog box, enter the Address and Port number. Then click OK.
- 4. Click Apply to enable the changes and Close to close the dialog box.

 Note: For complete instructions about configuring SNMP on a
managed device and trap forwarding, refer to the DIGITAL
ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide.

Integrating with Compaq Insight Manager

You can easily manage a mixed environment of DIGITAL and Compaq servers using either the DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Console or the Compaq Insight Manager Console.

Refer to the topics and tasks in this chapter for information about:

- Managing DIGITAL servers from the Insight Manager Console
- Managing DIGITAL servers from a web browser with web-enabled agents
- Managing Compaq servers from the ServerWORKS Manager Console

Use this chapter in conjunction with the *DIGITAL ServerWORKS*Manager Installation and User Guide and the Compaq Insight Manager
User Guide.

ServerWORKS integration with Insight Manager is available on Windows NT, SCO Unix, and Netware platforms.

Integrating with Compaq Insight Manager

Managing DIGITAL Servers from the Insight Manager Console

A new group of agents, which are called Compaq Management Agents for Digital Servers, enable the Insight Manager Console to query and manage DIGITAL servers.

These agents are installed automatically during a ServerWORKS installation. If you are an Insight Manager user, refer to the Compaq documentation for installation information.

Adding DIGITAL Servers to Insight Manager Device List

To enable the Insight Manager Console to query a DIGITAL server, you need to add the server to the Insight Manager device list:

1. At your management console, start Insight Manager.

The Device List window is displayed.




Figure 5-1 Compaq Insight Manager Device List Window

2. Click Setup \rightarrow Device List.

- 3. Click IP Device List.
- In the IP Device List dialog box, click New.
 A dialog box is displayed that allows you to add an entry to the IP Device List.
- 5. Enter the device name and the IP address of the DIGITAL server.
- 6. Click Add and then click Close.
- 7. In the Device List Setup window, select the server and click Add to move it to the Responsible Device List.

Note: To obtain the IP address from a WINS server, a DNS server, or from a Hosts file, click WINS/DNS IP Address Resolution. This feature allows Compaq Insight Manager to query a WINS or DNS server (if supported on your network) or to search a Hosts file to obtain the IP address of a given device using the Windows Sockets (WINSOCK) protocol. If you use this feature, you avoid the need to enter static IP addresses for each device.

Learning What You Can Manage

After you add a DIGITAL server to the Insight Manager device list, you can monitor and manage it as you would any Compaq server on the network.

To begin managing a DIGITAL server:


- 1. In the Device List window, right-click the DIGITAL server and choose View Device Data.
 - The Device View window is displayed. Notice that a DIGITAL server symbol replaces the Compaq server symbol in the center of the window.
- 2. From the Device View window, choose one of the seven groups of attributes to manage.

Managing DIGITAL Servers with Web-Enabled Agents

You can manage DIGITAL servers from a web browser over an intranet or the Internet. The software components necessary for web-based management are included on the ServerWORKS Manager CD.

These components include the DIGITAL agents for a specific Digital server and the Compaq agents for DIGITAL servers, which allows the DIGITAL agents to be viewed by Compaq Insight Manager and the Compaq Insight Manager HTTP Management server.

To install these components, install the DIGITAL server agent. The process of installing this agent automatically invokes the process to install Compaq agents for DIGITAL servers and the Compaq Insight Manager web management server.

Once installed, you can view DIGITAL server system details viewed using Microsoft Internet Explorer version 4.01 or greater. Direct the browser to the following URL:

<node name>:2301

Please note the it is important that you first verify that the web browser you intend to use conforms with the requirement as indicated above.

Managing Compaq Servers from the ServerWORKS Manager Console

ServerWORKS Manager gives you the ability to launch an application like Insight Manager *with context*. When you launch Insight Manager with context, the application opens with the data for a Compaq object that you have selected in ServerWORKS.



Note: If you installed Insight Manager before you installed ServerWORKS Manager, you may receive error messages involving SNMP trap services.

If you receive such an error message when you start ServerWORKS, you can ignore it. If you receive an error message when you launch Insight Manager, you need to change how SNMP trap services are configured. Go to the Window NT Control Panel and click Services. In the Services dialog box, change the SNMP Trap Services setting from Automatic to Manual.

The problem occurs because ServerWORKS attempts to use SNMP trap port 162, which Insight Manager has already taken.

Launching With Context

To set up Insight Manager to launch with context, perform the following steps:

- Configure the application to associate it with the object type.
- Specify the application as the default action for the object type.

Configuring Insight Manager

To configure Insight Manager:

- 1. From the Console, choose Tools \rightarrow Application Launch.
- 2. On the Configure Application Launch dialog box, select or enter the following information:
 - a. In the Object field, select the object type (for example Server.Compaq).
 - b. In the Menu Item Name field, enter the name for the menu option (for example, Insight Manager).
 - c. In the Application Path field, click on the browse button and search for the application. Be sure to use the full path and exact spacing (for example: "c:\Program Files\Compaq\Insight Manager\cim.exe").
 - d. In the Toolbar button field, choose any 16x16 pixel bitmap.
 - On the Application Command Line Setup group of the dialog box, enter the command that will launch the application. Always use exact spacing and match case sensitivity.

To launch Insight Manager, use the following command line:

You have the option of selecting statements for the command line. The Command Line Parameters selection list lets you choose from commonly used parameters, which are added to the Parameters and switches field. If your command line includes several commands, select Allow multiple objects and enter a delimiter type.

- 4. Choose Add to place the menu name on the Actions menu and add the bitmap as a toolbar button.
- 5. Choose Close.



Specifying Insight Manager as the Default Action


To specify Insight Manager as the default action:

- 1. Choose Tools \rightarrow Options.
- 2. On the Options dialog box, click on the Default Actions page.
- 3. From the object list, select the object type.
- 4. From the Action list, select Insight Manager.
- 5. Choose Close.

Opening Insight Manager With Context

To open Insight Manager with context:

From a Discovery map or hierarchical view, double-click on a Compaq server. Figure 5-3 illustrates a Compaq server as seen through Insight Manager and launched from a ServerWORKS Discovery map.

Compiling ServerWORKS MIBS into ManageWise

This appendix explains how to compile the ServerWORKS DIGITAL MIBs into ManageWise. The ServerWORKS CD contains seven MIB files that you can compile into ManageWise:

- bmc.mib the SNMP MIB of BMC Software
- exide.mib the SNMP MIB of Exide Electronics
- ntcmgt.mib DIGITAL's NT cluster management MIB
- raidmgr.mib DIGITALS's RAID Manager for Windows MIB
- stdupsv1.mib Internet Standard UPS MIB (based on RFC-1628)
- svrmgt.mib DIGITAL's server management MIB
- svrsys.mib DIGITAL's MIB describing a management interface to system information

Compiling MIB Files

To compile the ServerWORKS MIB files:

1. Locate the files on the ServerWORKS CD. They are in the following directory:

unsptmib\digital\unsup\novell

2. Copy the files to these ManageWise directories:

MW\NMS\SNMPMIBS\CURRENT
MW\NMS\SNMPMIBS\ALLMIBS

Note: Novell recommends keeping a copy of all MIBs in the ALLMIBS directory.

3. Select Tools \rightarrow SNMP MIB Compiler.

Note: The MIBs supplied on the ServerWORKS CD compile in ManageWise but generate a warning message concerning Annotations. Disregard this message, since the MIBs function properly.

The SNMP MIB Compiler compiles all the MIB text files located in the CURRENT directory into a single binary file:

MW\NMS\BIN\SNMPMIBS.BIN.

The SNMP MIB Browser and the SNMP protocol decoder use this file. The SNMP MIB Compiler also adds or updates any trap definitions to the alarm type database file, MW\NMS\NMSDB\TRAP.BTV, for use by the ManageWise alarm system.

This appendix reviews the ServerWORKS Alarm utilities and System Browser. For more detail refer to the *DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide*.

Setting Alarms

If you have integrated ServerWORKS Manager on an X86-based NT console, you can choose to set and view alarms and traps on DIGITAL devices using the Alarm Configuration utility.

Note: If you have integrated ServerWORKS Manager on an HP-UX or DIGITAL UNIX console, use the enterprise manager's Event Browser to view alarms for DIGITAL servers. You must first configure traps and traps destinations for your DIGITAL servers. For more information refer to the chapter in this guide that discusses your enterprise manager.

Alarm Configuration is a ServerWORKS Manager utility that is available from the DIGITAL menu.

The Alarm Configuration tool provides the mechanism for ServerWORKS agents to intelligently monitor the devices on which they are installed. Instead of relying on constant polling from the management console, ServerWORKS agents that are installed on managed systems interrogate themselves and notify the console when a unit reaches an alarm threshold, saving considerable bandwidth.


The Alarm Configuration Window and Toolbar

Use Alarm Configuration to set alarms on DIGITAL devices. You can manage minimal health alarms and user-defined console alarms.

The Alarm Configuration window displays a list of network hosts (the name assigned to the object) in the left pane and the alarm description and details in the right pane.


The alarm details include the host name, IP address, object type, a description, the alarm severity, the source of the alarm, the category, and its enabled status. You can choose which data is displayed and the order in which it appears. You can sort a column's data alphabetically by clicking on a column label. Figure B-1 illustrates the Alarm Configuration window.





You can use the menu options or the companion toolbar to work with alarms. (Figure B-2.)

Minimal Health Alarms

Minimal health is an installation option that provides a set of hardware-specific thresholds on X86-based NT platforms: Minimal health monitors environmental and operating conditions affecting:

- Power supplies
- Fans
- Voltage
- Temperature
- Hard disks
- Memory components

Processors



Hosts with minimal health enabled are identified by the red cross icon next to the host name in the Alarm Configuration window. The icon is displayed when at least one minimal health alarms is in effect.



Note: For more information about minimal health alarms, refer to the *DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide*.

User-Defined Console Alarms

Using the Alarm Configuration utility, you can create four kinds of user-defined alarms:

- System (interface) status alarms Report when a system or interface, such as an adapter, changes its status.
- SNMP traps Send SNMP messages that are triggered by the SNMP agent.
- Component status alarm Report the operational status of a DIGITAL server or node object.
- Component threshold alarms Report when a characteristic of a DIGITAL server meets a specified condition. For example, if the temperature exceeds a specified level, a threshold alarm is triggered.

 Note: For more information about user-Defined alarms, refer to the
DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide.

Using the System Browser

If you have integrated ServerWORKS Manager on an X86-based NT console, you can use the DIGITAL System Browser to obtain information about both static and dynamic parameters found in DIGITAL objects.

The System Browser (Figure B-3) organizes this information in a way that makes the most sense for DIGITAL managed devices and presents the information in a user-friendly manner. The information may be accessible using your enterprise management tools, but it is presented generically and may not be as informative.

To work with the System Browser, select SW System Browser from the pop up menu or

- 1. Double-click a DIGITAL icon.
- 2. Click the DIGITAL System Agent icon.

The System Browser uses information that SNMP agents provide to display:

- System configuration information that generally does not change.
- Current information that is refreshed each time you examine an
 object from the System Browser. Table B-1 shows the type of
 information found in each of the System Browser windows.
- Historical information. When current information is not available due to network of system problems, the System Browser displays node information that was previously collected and saved.
- Information about cluster members and cluster resources.
- Dynamic or historical graphed data.



This appendix explains how to use the command line to launch ServerWORKS Manager applications, and how to make modifications to the ServerWORKS Manager initialization file (swmgr.ini).

Command Line Access

Command line access lets you run specific ServerWORKS Manager applications from the DOS prompt. Modifying the initialization file will alter what information you see and how it is displayed by ServerWORKS Manager.

Command line access is intended for use with management environments other than ServerWORKS Manager. These commands will launch selected ServerWORKS Manager applications. The commands do not replace the graphical interface access to ServerWORKS Manager.

Modifying the Initialization File

The initialization file (swmgr.ini) lets you refine your use of ServerWORKS Manager. This section surveys the available initialization entry's that are useful for daily use and when using pagers, printers, and log files.



WARNING: The information in this appendix is intended for highly advanced users ONLY. Experimenting with any items detailed in this appendix could result in problems using your existing ServerWORKS Manager application.

Starting Applications from the Command Line

The following commands allow other management environments to launch selected parts of ServerWORKS Manager. These commands may fail under some environments. To avoid failure make sure the environment meets the following conditions:

- IP connectivity between the managed system and the ServerWORKS machine
- Agents must be installed on systems you wish to monitor
- The ServerWORKS Manager environment must be win-32 based
- ODBC runtime access should be available. The required Microsoft executables are available on the ServerWORKS Manager CD.

To use the commands as shown in this section, access a DOS box, or access Run from the Start menu. The applications available from the command line are:

- ServerWORKS Manager console
- Alarm configuration
- System browser
- Launchme



WARNING: When starting ServerWORKS Manager applications from the command line use only the command parameters and values documented. Other combinations are not supported.

The following sections detail each command and display any optional switches available in a table after each command description. Use spaces to separate commands, switches and values when using the command line interface.

Starting ServerWORKS

To start the ServerWORKS Manager console from the command line, access the directory level as shown.

```
C:>cd\program files\digital\swmgr
C:>pwmgmt.exe swmgr.ini
```

This starts the ServerWORKS Manager console.

Starting Alarm Configuration

To start the alarm configuration tool from the command line, access the directory level as shown.

```
C:>cd\program files\digital\swmgr
C:> alarmcfg
```

The optional switches allow you to point to specific servers or communities. The switch will not be recognized unless these objects have already been discovered by ServerWORKS Manager and are in the ServerWORKS Manager database. If no entries exist in the database, use the -1 switch to create an entry in the database.



WARNING: Server names should not contain dashes (-) in the naming conventions of ServerWORKS Manager. Most applications will parse the dash (-) as a command line switch. If the name does contain a dash, enclose the server name in double quotes. Example: -n <servername>

Example:

C:>alarmcfg -n "NiceServer-1" -cg eastcoast

Starting System Browser

To start the system browser from the command line, type the following:

C:>cd\program files\digital\swmgr

C:> smb

Starting the Launchme Utility

Launchme.exe was created to aid advanced users in testing executable files that interact with ServerWORKS Manager. Users can launch applications from three places within the ServerWORKS Manager interface:

- Tools → Application Launch (creates launchme as a global application)
- Tools \rightarrow Options \rightarrow Tools (creates a new Tools menu option)
- Tools → Action Directory Set Up (creates a new Tools menu option in Alarm Configuration)


To verify parameters, substitute launchme for your own application. Launchme verifies that the launch parameters of the application are correct. It displays a dialog box containing the parameters and syntax of the command line passed to it by the ServerWORKS Manager application. This allows you to verify that the command line was passed correctly to your executable.

In the following example, launchme is used to verify parameters passed to an alarm action. There are three sections to this task:

- Set up launchme as a global application.
- Create the alarm and associate an action (launchme) with it.
- Verify the parameters.

To Set Up Launchme

1. Click Tools→Options→Application Launch.



You can also use the command line.

C:\<defaultdirectory>\Launchme <parameter> <parameter>

The <defaultdirectory> is normally C:\program files\Digital\swmgr.

- 2. Complete the Configure Application Launch dialog box to add launchme to the Actions menu, as shown in the previous diagram.
- 3. Click Close.


To Create an Alarm and Associate an Action with It

To create an alarm, refer to your *DIGITAL ServerWORKS Manager Installation and User Guide* for information. To associate an action with the alarm, follow these steps:

- From the ServerWORKS Manager Console, click Tools → Alarm Configuration.
- 2. Associate an action with a trap or alarm on a host:




- a. Click the Action Directory button.
- b. Click Add New → Application Launch.
- c. In the Action Properties window, enter the launchme file name for the action.
- d. Choose the parameters that you want to use you can add a user-defined parameter — and click Apply.



3. Enter the Action name and click Close.

To Verify the Parameters

Wait for the previously created alarm to occur. Because the launchme application is associated with the alarm action, the launchme dialog appears when the alarm is triggered. A typical launchme dialog is shown below.



To verify other parameters, select a host from the map or hierarchical view and choose Actions \rightarrow Launchme. The dialog box will appear with the parameters as they were set in the Application Launch task.

The launchme display will show you the parameters that were passed. If the correct data was passed, you are ready to substitute the real application for the launchme action in the Action Directory Setup dialog box.

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Initialization File Settings

Initialization files let you tailor your use of ServerWORKS Manager, and in some cases troubleshoot problems. This section describes the initialization file settings used by ServerWORKS Manager.

The swmgr.ini file is located in the root directory of your ServerWORKS Manager application: C:\program files\Digital\swmgr. Many of these initialization entries may not exist in the swmgr.ini file. They must be added to the swmgr.ini file in a specific section of the file. If the section does not exist in your swmgr.ini file, add the section and the entry. The examples below show both the section, as [sectionname], followed by an entry.

WARNING: Before you begin to make any changes, we advise you to copy the swmgr.ini file and save it in a local directory for possible future use.

Pager

Pager settings are especially useful for troubleshooting pager problems and dealing with the limitations of older pages. You must have a solid understanding of your pager and modem systems before attempting these changes.

Printing

If printed reports do not appear as desired for alarm configuration or alarm viewer reports, swmgr.ini settings can be added to alter the print outs.

You can choose to alter just one setting, for example the left hand margin only (PrintMarginLeft), or all the settings.

The default settings do not correspond to a specific printer. You will have to try different values to obtain the results you want from your printer. Also, the measurements are taken from the printer that is attached to your system, and do not have a specific type of measure (pica, inches, etc.).



Data Collector

Sizing the Main Window Alarm Status Pane


The default sizing of all status panes is done automatically using WIN32 API calls. If you experience sizing problems, you can correct them by modifying the width for any of the seven panes.

The pane measurements are in pixels that are appropriate for your monitor and screen resolution. The default width settings are found in the [Setup] section in the swmgr.ini file after ServerWORKS Manager is run for the first time. Settings may vary. Different screen resolutions produce different values for each pane. In addition, the screen font may require different settings.

In the following diagram, the first pane has been resized to 150 pixels and the third pane, the divider, has been resized to 40 pixels. The settings in the next table are suggested defaults for a monitor with a resolution of 1024x768 pixels.

To change a pane width

- 1. In the [Setup] section of swmgr.ini, find the UseStatusPanelnSize parameter for the number pane you want to modify and change the setting to 1 (Enable).
- 2. In the corresponding StatusPanelnSize parameter, enter the number of pixels for the width you want.



The DIGITAL Server System MIB

This appendix documents the DIGITAL Server System management information base (MIB). This MIB provides access to the following information:

- Base system configuration
- Central processor (CPU) configuration and utilization
- System memory
- System buses and slots
- Peripheral devices
- Physical configuration
- Environment



Using the DIGITAL Server System MIB

Before you use the DIGITAL Server System MIB, you should understand:

- Support for MIB variables by hardware platform and operating system
- Conventions used in this appendix
- SNMP syntax extensions in the MIB

Support for MIB Variables

Support for the MIB variables described in this appendix is, to some extent, hardware platform and operating system dependent.

The hardware platforms include:

- X-86-based NT servers
- Alpha NT servers

A variable that returns useful information on one platform may not do so on the other platform. For example, Alpha servers do not return power status.

The operating systems supported are:

- Windows NT
- SCO UNIX
- Netware

The variable for the CPU polling interval returns useful information for NT and SCO but not for Netware.

In addition, some variables return useful information only from DIGITAL servers with advanced manageability features.

Advanced X-86-based Servers

Examples of X-86-based servers with advanced manageability features include:

- X16200
- DIGITAL Server 7100
- DIGITAL Server 5100, 5105, 5200
- DIGITAL Server 3100, 3105, 3200

Advanced Alpha-based Servers

Examples of Alpha-based servers with advanced manageability features include:

- AlphaServer 2100 and 2100A
- DIGITAL Server 7000 Alpha, or AlphaServer 4000 and 4100
- AlphaServer 1000 and 1000A

Conventions Used in This Appendix

In this appendix, each variable is introduced with a statement about hardware platform and operating system support.

For example, the svrCpuPollInterval variable is introduced with this statement:

All Platforms/NT and SCO UNIX Operating Systems

This indicates the variable is implemented on all X86-based and Alpha-based hardware platforms and returns useful data under the NT and SCO UNIX operating systems. Tables are introduced only with a statement of operating system support. For example, the svrFirmwareTable is introduced with this statement:

All Operating Systems

Base System Configuration

The base system configuration (svrBaseSysDescr) group of the MIB provides basic information about the hardware platform, the operating system, and the firmware installed on the server.

This section defines the MIB variables in this group and provides technical detail about each variable: the hardware platforms and operating systems that support it.

svrSystemFamily

All Platforms/All Operating Systems

The svrSystemFamily variable identifies the family of hardware platforms to which a server is a member. When queried, it returns one of the following numeric values:

This variable identifies the possible cause of a system shutdown. The syntax is *DisplayString*. This variable does not return useful information on the Xl6200, an advanced X86-based server.

SvrSystemRemoteMgrNum

All Platforms/All Operating Systems

If a server is managed remotely, this variable displays the telephone number of the remote manager. The syntax for this variable is *DisplayString*.

svrFirmwareTable

All Operating Systems

The svrFirmwareTable stores information about the firmware present on a system. It may include SRM and ARC console firmware; optionally Fail Safe Loader.

On X86-based systems, this table describes the system BIOS and may also include second levels, such as PALcode and BIOS emulator versions, if they are accessible to the software. On Alpha systems, this table includes the MIB version and driver versions.

The syntax for this variable is SEQUENCE OF SyrFirmwareEntry.

svrFirmwareIndex

All Platforms/All Operating Systems

This variable in the svrFirmwareTable represents an index value, which is unique to the local server, for a selected entry in the table. As defined in the MIB, the syntax for svrFirmwareIndex is *INTEGER*.

svrFirmwareDescr

All Platforms/All Operating Systems

This variable in the svrFirmwareTable describes the firmware as SRM console, ARC console, system BIOS, and so on. The syntax is *DisplayString*.

This variable in the svrFirmwareTable contains the firmware version number. The syntax for svrFirmwareRev is *DisplayString*.

svrFwSymbolTable

NT Operating System

The svrFwSymbolTable contains information about the soft switches and symbols that the firmware maintains. This information is specific to a server and may also be specific to an operating system or to a particular option.

The syntax for svrFwSymbolTable is *SEQUENCE OF SvrFwSymbolEntry*.

This variable contains the display name for the symbol name in the Graphical User Interface (GUI). The syntax is *DisplayString*.

Central Processor Configuration and Utilization

This section defines the MIB variables in this group and provides technical detail about each variable: the hardware platforms and operating systems that support it.

svrCpuPollInterval

The interval, given in seconds, between queries of the CPU to determine CPU usage. The value 0 (zero) disables polling. Otherwise values must be equal to or greater than the minimum polling interval. (svrCpuMinPollInterval).

The svrCpuRevision variable contains CPU version information presented in processor-specific format.

svrCpuFruIndex

Advanced X86-Based Servers and All Alpha-Based Servers/All Operating Systems

The svrCpuFruIndex variable cross-references the index value for this CPU entry in the FRU table (svrFruTable). This provides asset information about the component that contains this processor. The value is zero (0) if the asset information is not known. The syntax is *INTEGER*.

svrCpuSpeed

The svrCpuSpeed variable contains the speed this CPU expressed in megahertz (MHz). The value is 0 if the CPU speed is not known. The syntax is *INTEGER*.

svrPagingMemorySize

The svrMemFruIndex variable cross-references the index value of the FRU entry in the FRU table in which this memory is represented. The value is 0 (zero) if the index is not known.

The syntax for svrMemFruIndex is INTEGER.

All Operating Systems

The svrMemElementTable extends the server memory component table (svrMemComponentTable). It contains information that describes actual memory hardware elements, such as a SIMM or a DIMM. If the memory component cannot be decomposed into elements, a generic element may be listed in the table.

The syntax for svrMemElementTable is SEQUENCE OF SvrMemElementEntry.

svrMemElementIndex

Advanced X86-Based and All Alpha-Based Servers/All Operating Systems

The svrMemElementIndex contains an index value for an entry that is unique to the local server. The syntax for svrMemElementIndex is *INTEGER*.

This variable does not return useful information on the Xl6200, an advanced X86-based server, or on the AlphaServer 1000 and 1000A.

The syntax for svrMemElementSpeed is *INTEGER*.

svrMemElementStatus

Advanced X86-Based Servers/All Operating Systems

The svrMemElementStatus variable contains the current status of the memory module.

The syntax for svrMemElementSpeed is SystemStatus.

System Buses and Slots

All Platforms/All Operating Systems

The system buses and slots (svrBuses) group of the MIB provides basic information about EISA and PCI buses.

svrBusCount

All Platforms/All Operating Systems

The svrBusCount variable contains the number of buses that the operating system sees. The syntax for svrBusCount is *INTEGER*.

SvrBusTable

NT Operating System

The server bus table (svrBusTable) contains information about each bus that the operating system sees. The syntax for svrBusTable is SEQUENCE OF SvrBusEntry.

svrBusIndex

All Platforms/NT Operating System

The svrBusIndex variable contains an index value that is unique to the local server.

svrBusType

All Platforms/ NT Operating System

The svrBusType variable describes the type of bus an entry represents. The syntax for svrBusType is *BusTypes* — an extension to the SNMP *INTEGER* syntax type.

svrBusNumber

All Platforms/ NT Operating System

The svrBusNumber variable indicates the number of the bus. The value is unique among buses of the same type. The syntax for svrBusNumber is *INTEGER*.

SvrBusSlotCount

All Platforms/ NT Operating System

The svrBusSlotCount variable shows the number of physical slots on a bus. The value is zero (0) if the number is unknown. The syntax for svrBusSlotCount is *INTEGER*.

svrLogicalSlotTable

NT Operating System

The logical slot table (svrLogicalSlotTable) contains information about logical bus slots on a server. It is indexed by busIndex variable and slot number. A server may have more logical slots than physical slots. An entry in logical slot table does not have to be associated with a physical slot.
