Installing the Redundant Power Supply

This chapter provides the following information:

- A brief overview of the power configuration for the server processor of the StorageWorks FDDI Server
- Preinstallation tasks and considerations
- Instructions for installing a redundant power supply

1.1 Power Supply Modes of Operation

The server processor power supply supports the following two modes of operation:

1. Single power supply

This mode of operation provides all the power your system needs.

2. Dual (redundant) power supply

To increase reliability, you can add a redundant power supply. In redundant mode, the failure of one power supply does not cause the system to shut down. The current share cable (Figure 1–4) connects the two power supplies so that failover occurs immediately when power to the primary power supply is lost.

1.2 Power Supply Voltage Specifications

The current share signal, when connected to the same signal of the redundant power supply, allows the two power supplies to share load currents to within +/-10%. Current share is provided for the +5.0 V, +3.3 V and +12.0 V outputs.

No jumper needs to be installed to activate redundant mode power.

Total combined power of all outputs per supply cannot exceed 400 watts, and the combination of +3.3 V power and +5.0 V power cannot exceed 335 watts.

- 36 A or less of 3.3 V power
- 52 A or less of 5.0 V power
- 11 A or less of +12.0 V power
- 0.2 A or less of -12.0 V power
- 0.2 A or less of -5.0 V power

1.3 Preparing to Install a Power Supply

Before you install a redundant power supply, you need to prepare the server processor to receive the power supply. You need to assemble the required equipment, familiarize yourself with antistatic precautions, and remove the front cover of the server processor.

1.3.1 Required Equipment

You need the following equipment:

- Flat-blade screwdriver
- Phillips screwdriver
- Antistatic wrist strap

1.3.2 Proper ESD Protection


Static electricity can damage electronic components. Before you handle (remove or replace) internal system components, perform the following steps:

- 1. Obtain and attach an ESD wrist strap to your wrist.
- 2. Clip the other end of the ESD wrist strap to the chassis of the server processor.
- 3. Obtain an approved antistatic bag and/or a grounded antistatic mat.

1.4 Install the Power Supply

The following procedure describes how to install the redundant power supply. The primary power supply resides on the left front of the server processor and the redundant power supply resides directly to the right of the primary power supply as shown in Figure 1–1.





1.4.1 Connect the Terminal to the Server Processor

Note

You must have a console terminal connected to the FDDI Server's server processor to complete the installation procedures described in this chapter. If you have a terminal already connected, proceed to Section 1.4.2. If you do not have a terminal connected, follow the procedure below. Any terminal that supports ANSI control sequences can be used, including graphics displays that provide emulation of an ANSI-compatible video terminal.

- 1. Make sure the power switch on the back of the terminal is OFF (_).
- 2. Connect one end of the terminal cable to the back of the terminal.
- 3. Using a 5/32-inch hex wrench, open the rear door of the FDDI Server cabinet.




Figure 1–2 Connecting to the Terminal Port of the Server Processor

- 4. Connect the other end of the terminal cable to the EIA terminal port on the rear of the server processor using the female MMJ adapter (part number H8571–J) as shown in Figure 1–2.

- 5. Turn the terminal power switch to ON ().
- 6. Set the terminal at 9600 baud, with 8 data bits, 1 stop bit, and no parity. Refer to your terminal documentation for terminal setup instructions.

1.4.2 Shut Down the System

- 1. Stop all work on the server processor in which the redundant power supply is to be installed.
- 2. Perform an orderly shutdown of the operating system in the server processor by typing the following command at the DCL \$ prompt on the terminal connected to the server processor:

\$ @SYS\$SYSTEM:SHUTDOWN

3. When shutdown is complete, open the front door on the FDDI Server cabinet and depress the power button on the server processor Operator Control Panel (OCP) to turn off power.

1.4.3 Slide the Server Processor Out of the FDDI Server Cabinet

- 1. Unplug the ac power cord on the server processor.
- 2. Using a 5/32-inch hex wrench, open the back door of your FDDI Server cabinet.
- 3. Remove the red shipping brackets that hold the server processor in place.
- 4. Slide the server processor forward out of the front of the cabinet on its slides to enable you to access the front cover.

1.4.4 Install the Redundant Power Supply


- 1. Remove all the screws that attach the front cover to the chassis using a Phillips screwdriver (see Figure 1–3).
- 2. Pull off the front cover.


- 3. Remove the cover plate over the redundant power supply slot and discard the plate. Keep the screws for remounting the front cover on the redundant power supply.
- 4. Slide the redundant power supply into the chassis of the server processor to the right of the primary power supply (see Figure 1-1).
- 5. Connect all internal and external cables to the connectors on the back of the power supply. Connectors are shown in Figure 1-4.

Note

If you cannot access the redundant power supply, then remove the top rear cover.


Use the screws you retained to attach the front cover to the chassis and to the 6. installed power supplies. (See Figure 1-3.)

1.4.5 Replace the Server Processor in the FDDI Server

- 1. Replace the top rear cover if it was removed.
- 2. Slide server processor back into the FDDI Server cabinet.
- 3. Reinstall the red shipping brackets.
- 4. Using a 5/32-inch hex wrench, close the back door of your FDDI Server.
- 5. Plug in the ac power cord.

1.4.6 Power Up the Server Processor

- 1. Depress the power button on the OCP of the server processor to power up the server processor.
- 2. Shut the front door of the FDDI Server.
- 3. Press the Return key on the terminal connected to the server processor.
- 4. Type BOOT at the >>> prompt.

You have now completed the installation of the redundant power supply.

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
